Dear Margaret:

I just learned that you might reverse your vote on the street trees on Colorado Blvd. I'm writing to ask you to consider the following:

- 1. As you know, there are many varieties of Gingko with some being studier than others. For example the ones on Lombary Road which I believe were used in the Public Works slide show are stronger and larger than the ones proposed for the Playhouse District. Therefore, we are unsure the ones proposed for Colorado Blvd. are those that are approved by the U.N. Accords. By allowing this matter to go to UFAC, the community has an opportunity to examine this proposed species of Ginkgo and their ability to absorb carbon, a major sustainability issue. Other evergreen trees may also be proposed and examined.
- 2. There has been an outpouring of concern over the lack of shade canopy trees on Colorado (which Ginkgos do not provide for many months of each year). Many groups from Pasadena Beautiful to WPRA and Open Space Now to the Coalition for a Common Vision are committed to working with UFAC within a nine month time frame (and before Playhouse District Funding expires) to find a suitable canopy tree that contributes to carbon reduction. We bring to this effort people who are deeply committed to this issue because of their awareness of Climate Change and how each City must begin to evaluate its actions and policies on the basis of how it can contribute to carbon reductions. Leafy canopy shade trees fill the bill.
- 3. The bleakness you now see along Colorado Blvd. will be with us long into the future. So much for a walkable green city.

I understand that the Playhouse District Association will make two points. First, they will claim that these Ginkgos meet the requirements of the U.N. accords. We questions that claim. Meetings with UFAC should help us clear this us.

Second, they feel that the money now available for the tree planting will have to be supplemented to accommodate the removal of the existing Ginkgos. Yet the Business District behind the Playhouse Association will now have nine-months of new revenues in addition to what is currently budgeted for the tree planting. Out of an approximate yearly budget of \$630,000 plus \$165,000 from the City of Pasadena Parking Administration. they should be able to find the funds. After all, 44.60% of their annual budget is set aside for Design and Physical Enhancement.

Third, with the support of councilman Gordo, the Playhouse District will point out inconsistencies in city policies. This is no different than the inconsistencies that have surfaced on so many issues such as public art in the civic district. Yet decisions have to be made. So until the new City Manager has time to evaluate and bring these to the Council, let's move forward and allow the community to work with the Playhouse District in selecting a canopy street tree that we will all be happy to live with long into the future.

I hope with all my heart that you and the other Council members with a concern for sustainability will support the nine-month moratorium on tree planting currently proposed.

Apparently Pasadena Councilman Gordo simply doesn't understand what the public and Pasadena's Urban Forest Advisory Committee (UFAC) have told the Mayor and Council about protecting old trees and not replacing the destroyed mature trees with straggly gingkoes and invasive Mexican fan palms at high cost to the City. He has introduced the following agenda item into the City Council meeting tonight:

7B(3) CONSIDERATION OF AMENDMENT TO THE CITY COUNCIL MORATORIUM ON TREE PLANTING IN THE PLAYHOUSE DISTRICT AND IN OTHER PUBLIC AREAS (Councilmember Gordo)

There is no detailed, supplemental info. regarding exactly what Councilmember Gordo will propose tonight. The vagueness of this obscure agenda item makes one suspicious. I've called the Mayor's office and they allegedly have no idea anymore than we do what Councilmember Gordo will say. I called Councilmember Gordo's office to express my concern about the lack of information, but no one answered and I had to leave a phone message. I wager I will not be called back before the meeting tonight.

It's important that a strong public presence attend the City Council Meeting... again... to keep the City Council on track. It would be very easy for the City to backslide on the tree protections and streetscape reevaluation that is in progress. Please come yet one more time to speak on behalf of the tree moratorium and common sense street tree policies and plans:

Pasadena City Council Chambers 100 N. Garfield Ave., 2nd floor SE corner of the City Hall building Parking is usually available all around City Hall at that time of night.

One of the City managers told me there was concern that the tree moratorium has prevented (will prevent?) planting trees in celebration of Arbor Day. Oh please... That was clearly not the intent of the moratorium on tree cutting and planting. An exception for Arbor Day is no problem, but I'll bet there is more to Councilmember Gordo's amendment than just that concern.

Councilmember Gordo allegedly intends to urge immediate resumption of planting per the 13 year old streetscape plan. Who knows at this point what he will say; however, now is not the time to plant any trees! The non-native gingko trees and Mexican fan palms will not produce a significant shade canopy, due to their vertical form and the fact that the gingkoes will not thrive in the current street environment. Saplings will not receive needed water for growth (they will remain "twig trees") during the ongoing drought. Now is not the time to plant more saplings, at the end of the rainy season when the weather will soon grow dry and hot into summer.

In addition, current tree wells at the base of street trees are totally insufficient for any tree's health, because there is far too little exposed dirt to allow for rain absorption (when we do get rain) in the concrete sidewalk. Pasadena has spent \$103,000 on removing magnificent old trees and implementing the Pasadena Playhouse District's bad streetscape plan to date, but the City has not taken adequate care of its remaining trees. Any available money should be spent on retrofitting current insufficient tree wells, fixing sidewalks, property pruning trees around street lamps, along with whatever other upgrades are recommended by UFAC... not on planting new trees at this time.

The tree moratorium was implemented to permit a comprehensive re-evaluation of the current streetscape plan on Colorado Blvd. (and elsewhere) in order to protect remaining old trees and to revise the "plant palette" of new trees in the future. Many of the gingkoes planted 10 years ago have died or remain tiny stick trees. Mexican fan palms have not been popular with the public, because they "look like telephone poles" at pedestrian eye level and cast no significant shade. The "instant palms" recently planted make Pasadena look more like a new mall in Antelope Valley than historic old Pasadena. The moratorium was also implemented to give City staff and UFAC time to compare tree policies, green initiatives and to reduce conflict and loopholes in tree protection mandates.

Councilman Gordo is clearly responding to pressure from the disgruntled business owners and

the Pasadena Playhouse District Association. Business owners resent their signs getting blocked by mature tree foliage. Business owners also get little help from the City in caring for trees to prevent sidewalk uplift, etc. The answer is not to go forward with a bad streetscape plan that has already cost the lives of numerous old trees and destroyed active birds nests. The answer is for the City to assist business owners with problems generated by a lack of proper care for existing trees and for the City to consider species of replacement trees more appropriate for an "urban forest" than the failed gingkoes and problematic Mexican fan palms. Native Pasadena Oaks and other trees would be far better choice than the old plan's gingkoes and palms.

If you cannot attend the meeting tonight, please call or e-mail the Mayor and CC Councilmembers ASAP today (e-mail addresses listed below). Request that the tree moratorium stand with no further tree cutting or the plantings of gingkoes and palms until tree protection regulations and the outdated, 13 year old streetscape plan can be fully reviewed, particularly by the Urban Forest Advisory Committee (UFAC). Express your frustration with the lack of information about Councilmember Gordo's "amendment" on the agenda and with how many meetings the public has been forced to attend on behalf of Pasadena trees.

Certain business owners, like Joel Sheldon of Vromans, and members of the Pasadena Playhouse District Association, caused the old Indian Laurel Fig and Carrotwood trees that shaded Colorado Blvd. to be cut down. They've made their own sidewalks bare and should live with what they've wrought until better trees can be selected for that area. It takes a lot of hutzpah for these folks to demand expensive trees be planted immediately after what they've done to denude the Blvd of healthy old trees.

May common sense and fairness prevail.

Councilman Gordo has introduced the following agenda item into the City Council meeting tonight:

7B(3) CONSIDERATION OF AMENDMENT TO THE CITY COUNCIL MORATORIUM ON TREE PLANTING IN THE PLAYHOUSE DISTRICT AND IN OTHER PUBLIC AREAS (Councilmember Gordo)

There is no detailed, supplemental info. regarding exactly what Councilmember Gordo will propose tonight. Why not? The vagueness of his obscure agenda item, on what has been an important topic of interest for the public, makes those of us who have attended many meetings to assure protection for Pasadena's trees quite suspicious. I called Councilmember Gordo's office to express my concern about the lack of information and to find out more about his concerns; however, no one answered and I had to leave a phone message.

Pasadena needs to let its own Urban Forestry Advisory Committee (UFAC) and staff do its work based the recent Council motion. Please do not let Councilman Gordo reopen a can of worms.

City staff told me there was concern that the tree moratorium has prevented (will prevent?) planting trees in celebration of Arbor Day. That was clearly not the intent of the moratorium on tree cutting and planting. An exception for Arbor Day is no problem; however, we are concerned that there is more to Councilmember Gordo's amendment than just that minor issue.

Councilmember Gordo allegedly intends to urge immediate resumption of planting per the 13 year old streetscape plan. Who knows at this point what he will say. Regardless, now is not the time to plant any trees. The non-native gingko trees and Mexican fan palms will not produce a significant shade canopy, due to their vertical form and the fact that the gingkoes will not thrive in the current street environment. Saplings will not receive needed water for growth (they will remain "twig trees") during the ongoing drought. Now is not the time to plant vulnerable saplings, especially of an inappropriate species, at the end of the rainy season when the weather will soon grow dry and hot into summer.

In addition, current tree wells, some with decorative wrought iron grates, at the base of street trees in the Pasadena Playhouse District are totally insufficient for any tree's health, because there is far too little exposed dirt to allow for rain absorption (when we do get rain) in the concrete sidewalk. Pasadena has spent \$103,000 on removing magnificent old trees and implementing the Pasadena Playhouse District's bad streetscape plan to date, yet the City has not taken adequate care of its remaining trees. Any available money should be spent on retrofitting current insufficient tree wells, fixing sidewalks, property pruning trees around street lamps, along with whatever other upgrades are recommended by UFAC... It would be a waste of money planting new trees at this time.

I strongly oppose Council Member Victor Gordo's Agenda Item 7B(3) which is on tonight's City Council agenda that would allow planting of invasive Mexican fan palms and gingko trees on Colorado Boulevard.

These trees provide no shade and will only help to destroy the character of our beautiful city. I have often noted how Pasadena is an oasis of beauty in the Los Angeles area and noted that a major part of that is the number of beautiful, mature shade trees this city has.

Dear Mayor Bogaard:

The Playhouse District Association requests City Council assistance to mitigate the negative consequences to downtown economic vitality, the pedestrian environment, and quality of life due to the March 23rd Council vote to stop street tree planting on Colorado Boulevard pending a formal review of the adopted street tree plan. The Council's action results in an extended period ahead without the environmental, climate change and esthetic benefits of street trees on Colorado Boulevard in the District.

Give Clear Direction on the Process and Schedule:

- 1. <u>Commit to Colorado Boulevard Tree Planting by February 2010.</u> Expedite Colorado Boulevard tree plan review to insure a resolution for the Winter/Spring 2010 planting season. In order to achieve this result, we urge Council to set a timeline calling for review to be completed by summer 2009 in order to give time for the development of the design specifications, UFAC review and Council action prior to February 2010.
- 2. <u>Insure a Unified, Consistent Planting Scheme.</u> Direct City staff and consultants to develop a unified, consistent tree planting scheme of 36" box or larger specimens from Los Robles to Lake Avenue, to be implemented in one phase.
- 3. Establish tree selection criteria appropriate for a business district, including drought tolerance; non-invasive growth; canopy density appropriate for a commercial street; air quality and greenhouse gas benefits; compatibility with street lighting, façade/signage, esthetic and pedestrian/disabled safety needs of a commercial district; and maintenance costs for the City and adjacent property owners.
- 4. <u>Appoint UFAC Commissioners with Business District Experience.</u> The Urban Forestry Advisory Committee currently has two vacancies. Direct the Recreation and Parks Commission to utilize its authority to appoint UFAC commissioners with experience in the Central Business District community before the Master Street Tree Plan review begins.

- 5. <u>Involve the Playhouse District Association</u> and Playhouse District businesses, residents, and property owners in an advisory capacity in the tree selection and Streetscapes Plan amendment process.
- 6. Engage a landscape architect to assist the City in preparing a timely amendment to the Playhouse District Streetscapes, Walkways and Alleys Plan tree planting scheme and Street Tree Master Plan for Council Action by late 2009 in order to allow planting by February 2010.
- 7. <u>Protect the Playhouse District's tree planting funds.</u> Existing funds must be reserved for planting in the Playhouse District in early 2010.
- 8. Augment the tree planting fund as needed to secure 36" box or larger specimens, and to replace existing trees that are inconsistent with the new unified, consistent scheme that results from the revised Streetscapes Plan.

Expedite the Following Immediate Colorado Boulevard Improvements:

9. <u>Fund Completion of the Playhouse District Streetscape Plan</u>, including the remaining landscaping, paving, and street furniture, in the 2010/2011 budget.

10. **Provide funds for new Playhouse District banners** on Colorado Boulevard; PDA will provide an in-kind match of camera-ready new artwork for the banners.

Since I am unable to attend tonight's City Council Meeting, I am sending my request that you exempt the Playhouse District from the tree planting moratorium so trees can be planted now to take advantage of the spring growing season.

I understand there have been concerns expressed about the gingko trees and that some people think a different tree would be better. That may be. However, the gingko tree is the tree that Pasadena chose through a considerable process and for all the right reasons. It is part of a much larger treescape plan that is consistent along Colorado Boulevard.

Another concern expressed the lack of canopy of the gingko. I dropped off 4 photos this morning at the clerk's office and asked the clerk to provide them to Councilman Gordo, who made the motion to reconsider the tree planting moratorium in the Playhouse District. I took these photos last week on Allen just north of the Huntington Library to demonstrate a beautiful gingko tree canopy.

I am the president of the Homeowners Association at Granada Court which is just behind the Vromans parking lot. We have 31 units here, with owners and tenants who have moved here to take advantage of the urban living, and we are eager to get trees planted in the district! We expected that the Playhouse District tree planting would proceed as planned. Please do not abandon this plan that had approval from all constituents and is consistent with other plans in the City. It would be a crime to wait a year to plant these trees. If there is concern about how fast a canopy would grow, plant a bigger tree and plant it soon!
