SUBJECT: APPROVAL OF A JOURNAL VOUCHER AMENDING PROJECTS IN THE FISCAL YEAR 2012 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM BUDGET

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council approve a journal voucher with a net increase of \$2,302,954 amending 19 projects in the Fiscal Year 2012 Capital Improvement Program Budget as detailed in the Fiscal Impact section of this report.

BACKGROUND:

As part of the process to update the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget, the Department of Public Works has completed this report detailing necessary budget adjustments. The budget adjustments are needed due to changes in the status of various capital projects. The budgetary changes to the projects are listed below and must be recognized through the City's journal voucher process to formalize the changes. The changes are summarized in Attachment A.

 La Pintoresca Teen Center (71146) – Staff recommends recognizing and appropriating \$46,128 in CDBG funds to close this project. On December 13, 2010, the City Council in conjunction with Pasadena Community Development Commission approved an amendment to the 2010 – 2011 CDBG Annual Action Plan to increase CDBG funding to the La Pintoresca Teen Education Center project by \$60,000. However, action was not memorialized through the journal voucher process. The Teen Center opened on time and under budget and as a result only \$46,128 of the allotted \$60,000 is needed for the project.

2. Preventive Maintenance – Asphalt Streets FY 2011 - 2015 (73901)

Staff recommends the following amendments to this project:

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- A. Recognize and appropriate \$1,335,008 in Federal Surface Transportation Program – Local (STPL) funds. The city was notified by METRO that these funds could be used in totality without a local match as a part of METRO's Toll Credit program. These funds will allow for the resurfacing of an additional 2.5 miles of streets in FY 2012 for a total of five miles. This is still below the City's annual goal of eight miles of resurfacing needed to maintain the quality of City streets.
- B. Recognize and appropriate \$25,000 in Private Capital from the development at 155 Cordova Street to this project. These funds were collected as a condition of development for the installation of a median island on Cordova Street at Arroyo Parkway.
- C. Transfer \$460,859 in Private Capital from this project to *Preventive Maintenance Asphalt Streets –2010* (73580). These funds are developers' payments to the City for fixing damaged asphalt and repaving work necessitated by their developments. The work was done as part of the Preventive Maintenance (PM) Asphalt Streets 2010 (73580) project and not the newer PM Asphalt street project. This transfer will correct this misappropriation and allow the 2010 project to be closed.
- 3. Preventive Maintenance Asphalt Streets 2010 (73580) Staff recommends recognizing and appropriating \$290,520 in Traffic Congestion Relief funds and \$3,225 in Private Capital to this project so it can be closed. When streets are resurfaced with Federal or State money (as was the case with this project), the American Disability Act (ADA) requires wheelchair ramps on street corners be brought up to current ADA standards. This includes installing truncated domes and ensuring the grade of wheelchair ramps is no greater than 8.33 percent. The scope of work for the Preventive Maintenance (PM) Asphalt Streets 2010 project included adding truncated domes to 223 wheelchair ramp locations. Once project work began, 192 wheelchair ramp locations were found to exceed the grade requirement and had to be completely reconstructed to meet the current wheelchair ramp grade requirement. This was not included in the original scope of the project.
- 4. Building Preventive Maintenance FY 2011 2015 (71901) Staff recommends recognizing and appropriating \$22,515 in Private Capital received from T-Mobile for the placement of a cell tower on the upper parking lot at the City Yards. The funds will be used for slurry sealing the road that runs through the yards.
- 5. Delacey, Schoolhouse, and Marriott Garage Improvements (72197) Staff recommends recognizing and appropriating \$154,200 in Old Pasadena Parking Fund to this project. The funds will be used to work on the emergency power and lighting systems, clearance bars, and updated directional signage at the Schoolhouse and Delacey garages. This appropriation was inadvertently omitted when the FY 2012 CIP was adopted.

6. South Access Pedestrian Bridge to the Sierra Madre Villa Light Rail Station (75068) and Replacement of Medium Duty Transit Vehicles (75040) – Staff recommends transferring \$500,000 in Proposition C, \$1,390,442 in Proposition A - Transit, and \$609,558 in Blue Line Construction Authority funds to the *Replacement of Medium Duty Transit Vehicles (75040)* project. On December 13, 2010, Council approved an agenda report amending the project scope of the South Access Pedestrian Bridge and lowering the total estimate project cost. This will formalize that previously approved action. The transferred funds will be used toward the replacement of 15 ARTS buses.

Sufficient funds will remain in the new scaled down project – South Access Pedestrian Corridor to the Sierra Madre Villa Light Rail Station (75068).

- 7. Playhouse District Streetscapes (73397) Staff recommends appropriating \$120,134 in Street Occupancy Fees to this project so it can be closed. Project expenses exceeded the budget due to the extensive review and revision of the tree removal and planting elements of the Playhouse District Streetscape Master Plan. As a result of the community outreach and input, larger trees were planted than originally planned. The larger trees cost significantly more.
- Traffic Light Synchronization Program (75710) Staff recommends unappropriating \$112,000 in Proposition 1B – TLSP Grant from this project. The project scope was reduced from eight to six major arterial corridors reducing the total estimated cost and the grant by this amount.
- Central Arroyo Brookside Park Gate Renovation (77376) Staff recommends recognizing and appropriating \$6,828 in Residential Impact Fees to close this project. The project budget was \$60,000 and expenses totaled \$66,828. The overage was due to design changes during the construction phase of the project.
- 10. Tree Replacement/Planting Citywide (78956) Staff recommends recognizing and appropriating \$4,376 from the Street Tree Revenue to close this project. The project was completed slightly over budget at a cost of \$267,876. This appropriation will allow this project to be closed.
- 11.SR 710 Mitigation Projects (various) In 2000, the City received \$24.5 million in Federal funds to mitigate traffic congestion along the SR 710 Corridor due to the freeway gap. On June 17, 2002, the City Council approved eight SR 710 Mitigation projects. The budget for the eight projects totaled \$34,519,618 from the following sources:

The projects have been completed and expenses totaled \$35,029,003. In order to close the projects, funding needs to be reallocated between projects and \$509,385 needs to be appropriated to cover the shortfall. The \$509,385 will come from these sources: \$330,125 in Private Capital from the remaining balance on the *Paseo Colorado Street and Traffic Mitigation (75029)* project, \$99,140 in Gold Line Surplus funds from the *South Access Pedestrian Corridor to the Sierra Madre Villa Light Rail Station (75068)* project, and \$80,120 from the available Street Occupancy Rental Charges. To complete the necessary journal vouchers, funds need to be unappropriated from the eight projects and reappropriated as detailed on Exhibit A – 710 Mitigation Projects – New Funding Allocation Details.

COUNCIL POLICY CONSIDERATION:

All of the above projects and actions address the City Council's goals to "Maintain fiscal responsibility and stability" and "Improve, maintain, and enhance public facilities and infrastructure." Also, all of the projects have been found consistent with the General Plan.

ENVIRONMENTAL ANALYSIS:

As work for each project moves through the City's approval process, the appropriate environmental analysis will be conducted and brought to the City Council.

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FISCAL IMPACT:

The cumulative impact of these recommendations will increase the FY 2012 CIP budget by \$2,302,954. The specific funding sources are listed below and Exhibit B shows the detail changes to each project.
