SUBJECT: ADOPTION OF FY 2014 - 2018 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT

PROGRAM BUDGET

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council adopt by resolution the City's FY 2014 – 2018 Capital Improvement Program budget as summarized in Exhibit B contained in the resolution and any changes passed by a motion of the City Council at the May 20, 2013 meeting.

ADVISORY COMMISSION RECOMMENDATIONS:

On March 12, 2013, the Recreation and Parks Commission voted to support the *Parks and Landscaping* and the *Arroyo Projects – Central Arroyo* and *Arroyo Projects – Lower Arroyo* sections of the Recommended FY 2014 – 2018 Capital Improvement Program (CIP).

On March 14, 2013, the Northwest Commission voted to support the projects located completely or partially in Northwest Pasadena in the Recommended FY 2014 – 2018 CIP.

On March 26, 2013, the Hahamongna Watershed Park Advisory Committee voted to support the *Arroyo Projects* – *Hahamongna* section of the Recommended FY 2014 – 2018 CIP.

On March 27, 2013, the Planning Commission found the 19 new projects consistent with the General Plan.

On March 28, 2013, Transportation Advisory Commission voted to support the *Streets* and *Streetscapes, Transportation*, and *Parking* sections of the Recommended FY 2014 – 2018 CIP.

BACKGROUND:

On April 22, 2013, a public hearing on the Recommended FY 2014 – 2018 CIP budget was opened. Concurrently, copies of the Recommended FY 2014 – 2018 CIP were placed in all public libraries. The budget document is also available on the City's website at http://cityofpasadena.net/PublicWorks/Capital_Improvement_Program/.

On April 29, 2013, a Joint Finance Committee/City Council meeting was held to review and discuss the Recommended FY 2014 – 2018 CIP budget. Councilmembers supported forwarding the budget recommendations to the City Council for adoption and approved a motion to include \$100,000 of funding for play equipment at the former Linda Vista School site as part of the *School Park Site Improvements* project and \$150,000 of funding for the design of a new park *El Molino/Union Park – New Development* project in the FY 2014 CIP budget. However, staff will be removing the *El Molino/Union Park – New Development* project pending further analysis and discussion with the Playhouse District.

This five-year capital plan contains 226 active projects with a total estimated cost of \$916,435,635. The attached resolution contains Exhibit B which details and recommends an appropriation of \$94,794,107 to 99 projects for FY 2014. This process of adopting a formal resolution complies with City ordinances.

Attachment A is a summary of each project category showing the total dollars funded in the Recommended FY 2014 – 2018 CIP. The following adjustments to the printed Recommended FY 2014 - 2018 CIP have been reviewed by the Finance Committee and are incorporated into the budget document.

- Preventive Maintenance Asphalt Streets FY 2011-2015 (73901) Reduce the recommended Gas Tax appropriation to \$200,000 and appropriate \$1,300,000 of Federal Surface Transportation Program (STP) Funds to this project. Many of the street segments slated for work in FY 2014 are eligible for STP funding.
- 2. **School Park Site Improvements (78801)** Appropriate \$100,000 in Residential Impact Fee to this project so installation of new play equipment at the former Linda Vista School site can begin in FY 2014.
- 3. Citywide Sports Fields Improvements (78044) Reduce appropriation of Residential Impact Fees to \$100,000. The cost of renovating the softball field at Washington Park will be less than originally anticipated.
- 4. Restroom Bldgs (Replace or Construct) Various Parks (78038) Expand the scope of this project to include the replacement of the restroom at La Pintoresca Park and increase the total estimated project cost from \$5,774,623 to \$6,174,623.
- 5. North Marengo Avenue Bicycle Boulevard (75703) Expand the scope of this project to include lane reductions on Marengo Avenue between the 210 Freeway

and Orange Grove Boulevard, installation of bike lanes and two-way left turn median. This grant funded project was completed under budget so the scope has been expanded to include this stretch of Marengo. Staff originally thought this project would be completed in FY 2013 and it was removed from the Recommended FY 2014 CIP.

- 6. Restoration, Upgrades, and Repairs of the Civic Auditorium, Convention Center and Ice Rink Appropriate \$200,000 in Pasadena Center Operating Company Funds instead of \$150,000 as printed in the Recommended FY 2014 2018 CIP budget book. The replacement of the Convention Center air walls was added to the FY 2014 list of work to be completed.
- 7. Civic Auditorium Carpet Replacement and Seat Re-upholstery Appropriate \$400,000 in Pasadena Center Operating Company Funds instead of \$500,000 as printed in the Recommended FY 2014 2018 CIP budget book. The cost of replacing the carpet is less than originally anticipated.
- 8. **GT-1 and GT-2 Renewals, Replacements, and Improvements (3182)** Appropriate \$1,070,000 instead of \$4,500,000 as was printed in the Recommended FY 2014 2018 CIP. Expenditures for FY 2013 will be lower than originally anticipated.

Attachment B contains the transmittal letter from the City Manager that highlights the FY 2014 - 2018 CIP budget.

COUNCIL POLICY CONSIDERATION:

All projects in the Recommended CIP address the City Council's goals to maintain fiscal responsibility and improve, maintain, and enhance public facilities and infrastructure. As well as increase conservation and sustainability, improve mobility and accessibility throughout the City, support and promote the quality of life and local economy and ensure public safety. Also, all the projects are consistent with the General Plan.

ENVIRONMENTAL ANALYSIS:

As work for each project moves through the City's approval process, the appropriate environmental analysis will be conducted and brought to the City Council.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Approval of the City Manager's Recommended CIP budget and the proposed budget revisions detailed in this report will establish the FY 2014 – 2018 Capital Improvement Program with a total appropriation of \$94,794,107. Details regarding the sources of funding are summarized below and in Exhibit B, which is a part of the resolution.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Pasadena has received and reviewed the City Manager's recommendations for the Fiscal Year 2014 – 2018 Capital Improvement Program as amended by the Finance Committee; and

Section 1. 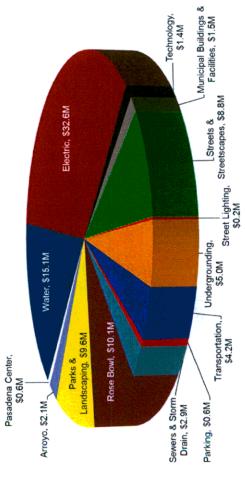

SUBJECT: Fiscal Year 2014 to 2018 Capital Improvement Program

contains 226 active projects with a total estimated cost of \$916,435,635. The FY 2014 CIP budget contains 19 new projects, It is my privilege to transmit the FY 2014 to 2018 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Budget. The CIP is a compilation of infrastructure and major maintenance projects designed to preserve the foundation of this great city. This five-year plan and appropriates \$94,794,107 to 99 projects in the 14 CIP categories shown below:





The "Future Projects" section of the CIP document identifies 185 projects with a total estimated project cost of \$483,328,422. These infrastructure needs are not part of the five-year CIP funding plan. Identifying these projects as part of the program, allows staff to pursue funding opportunities when and if they become available.

BUDGET PRIORITIES

The CIP addresses and furthers the City Council's Strategic Plan Goals which are to:

- Maintain fiscal responsibility and stability.
- Improve, maintain and enhance public facilities and infrastructure.
- Increase conservation and sustainability.
- Improve mobility and accessibility throughout the city.
- Support and promote the quality of life and local economy.
 - Ensure public safety.

In addition, project managers consider the following priorities when they identify and create CIP projects and recommend

- The project is needed to address a particular safety concern.
- The project is necessary because existing maintenance efforts are no longer satisfactory and repair costs exceed the replacement cost.
- An existing facility or system is no longer adequate to meet the demand.
- The project cost exceeds \$50,000.

BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

The following budget highlights demonstrate how the CIP furthers the City Council goals and priorities.

Maintain fiscal responsibility and stability

appropriations are for the current fiscal year, the five year forecast allows the City to develop funding strategies. As part of the identifying new construction and major maintenance projects that will preserve and expand the City's infrastructure. While the FY 2014 CIP budget, nine projects were awarded grant funding totaling \$10,321,775 from various State and Federal sources. A major factor in ensuring the City's fiscal stability is long term planning. The CIP budget helps the City plan for the future by

A significant portion of the funding for the CIP is derived from dedicated funding Federal and State funding sources (e.g. Gas Tax, TDA Article 3 and Proposition A - Transit), and local funding such as Residential Impact Fees, Sewer Maintenance and Construction Funds, Sewer Facility Charge, Undergrounding Utilities Fund, and Water and Power Funds. As a result, the funding options available for CIP projects are limited to the type of funding available. This presents a challenge in funding some of the larger CIP projects that either do not have a dedicated funding source or where the funding source is

Improve, maintain and enhance public facilities and infrastructure

A primary focus of the CIP is to improve, maintain and enhance the City's public facilities and infrastructure as reflected in projects contained throughout the 14 sections of the CIP document. Highlights in the FY 2014 budget include:

- Seismic Retrofit and Rehabilitation of Fire Station 39 will be completed in FY 2014. This station has been temporarily relocated due to the unsafe condition of the building.
 - renovations will substantially renovate this historical landmark to ensure it is able to optimize functionality, enhance The Rose Bowl Renovation Project will continue in FY 2014 with an additional appropriation of \$8,800,000. Increase conservation and sustainability

The CIP promotes the City Council's vision for a safe, healthy and sustainable environment by incorporating environmentally sound standards into all improvements when available. Notable efforts in this year's CIP are:

recycled tires to repave the streets. The RAC benefits the environment by reusing scrap tire rubber and diverting The Preventive Maintenance - Asphalt Streets project will use rubberized asphalt concrete (RAC) containing

- tires from landfills and stockpiles, uses less material than conventional asphalt concrete which results in less aggregates (mining) and asphalt (drilling) and less energy to produce. Finally, the RAC absorbs noise.
- The City will install energy efficient lights in Repair and/or Replacement of Existing Street Lighting Systems and also 50,000 to 100,000 hours, and consume approximately 60 percent less energy than high pressure sodium luminaries as part of the Street Lighting and Electric System Undergrounding projects. Energy efficient lights life range from which have an average life of 24,000 hours.
- Expansion and upgrades of electric vehicle charging facilities through the Zero Emission Vehicle Charging Stations
- The *Pasadena Bicycle Program FY* 2010 2014 project will promote bicycle riding for commuting and recreation as well as increasing the use of non-motorized modes of transportation within the City.

Improve mobility and accessibility throughout the city

Many of the Transportation section CIP projects enhance and improve mobility and accessibility throughout the City. Traffic management remains a key element of the CIP budget.

FY 2014 CIP is over \$11 million worth of improvements to various City parks including the Arroyo and a new Rose Bowl Entry. efforts to improve the Pasadena Center and Rose Bowl make Pasadena a desirable place to live. Most notable as part of the

Work will continue on the implementation of the 311 Citizen Request Management project to expand the centralized call center operations to provide a more enhanced and efficient customer service experience. A newly lighted soccer field at Muir High School will provide additional field space for youth sports. The development of a new park will also greatly enhance the quality of life for Pasadena residents and visitors alike. The new Desiderio Park will provide 3.9 acres of parkland. In addition, renovations at the Rose Bowl will continue with an additional \$8.8 million worth of work.

The continuation of the Pasadena Wayfinding System project in this CIP, which implements a wayfinding system that guides community, improves access, identification and connectivity to adjacent areas with the ultimate goal of promoting economic users to and from their destinations of choice, enhances the experience of being in Pasadena. This creates a sense of vitality through convenient destination finding signage in local shopping areas.

Staff works with neighborhood residents to develop plans that meet individual neighborhoods' needs.

There are currently 54 existing CIP projects located partially or completely in Northwest Pasadena with Finally, as part of the City's ongoing commitment to enhancing the quality of life and the local economy, the CIP notes all projects located in Northwest Pasadena. The northwest area of Pasadena is home to over 50,000 residents and 2,000 businesses. This diverse community continues to experience successful economic revitalization and rebirth with recent \$15 million appropriated in FY 2014.

Ensure public safety

Examples of projects that enhance public safety include:

- Based on their collision history, improvements will be completed on three intersections warranting upgrades. They are included in the Left Turn Signal Phasing at Colorado Blvd. and Orange Grove Blvd. and at Orange Grove Blvd. and Holly St. and Traffic Signal Improvements at Pasadena Ave. and Walnut St. projects.
 - In FY 2014 security lighting will be installed in four parks (La Pintoresca, Brenner, McDonald and Eaton Blanche) thereby enhancing visibility and providing a higher level of security to our park patrons.
 - The continued work on the Pedestrian Safety Enhancements at Signalized Intersections and the Pedestrian Accessibility FY 2011 – 2015 projects will improve pedestrian safety.
