Charter City / Home Rule Background

City Attorney's/City Prosecutor's Department – Civil Division

- 1886 Pasadena incorporated
- 1901 Pasadena voters approve Charter
- Charter city control over "municipal affairs"
 - City law regarding "municipal affair" prevails over conflicting State law on same topic



City Attorney's/City Prosecutor's Department - Civil Division

Examples of Municipal Affairs	<u>Not</u> a Municipal Affair
Form of City government	Traffic and vehicle regulation
Elections	Tort claims against a public entity
Local zoning and land use	Regulation of school systems
Taxes and assessments	



State Law Prevails Over Conflicting Charter City Measure in Certain Circumstances

City Attorney's/City Prosecutor's Department – Civil Division

Where charter city measure conflicts, State law prevails where

State law addresses a statewide concern (based on considerations below)

AND

State law is

- Legislature may not (a) determine what constitutes a municipal affair; and/or (b) change a municipal affair into a statewide concern
- Court's inquiry focuses on "identification of a convincing basis for legislative action originating in extramunicipal concerns, one justifying legislative supersession based on sensible, pragmatic considerations"

- Reasonably related to resolution of that concern; and
- Narrowly tailored to limit incursion into legitimate municipal interests

JAG grants conditioned on immigration enforcement

Four Ways to Seek to Preserve Local Control

City Attorney's/City Prosecutor's Department – Civil Division

Lobbying – with legislative/regulatory bodies

Seek Attorney
General opinion

File **lawsuit** to challenge relevant laws/regulations

File amicus curiae (friend of the court) brief at appellate levels of litigation involving other cities
