

Creation of a Community Police Oversight Commission

- Across the nation communities are re-assessing:
 - > The role of police in our society
 - > Funding levels for law enforcement relative to social services
 - > The laws, policies and procedures governing police departments.
 - > The appropriate level of civilian oversight
- In Pasadena:
 - > Renewed calls for enhanced civilian oversight
 - To build greater trust with the community
 - To provide a formal mechanism for community input into policing issues





- Public Safety Committee Discussions
 - June 24th reviewed 2016 analysis and identified key legal questions
 - > July 8th City Attorney analysis
 - Structure, roles and responsibilities of existing police review boards
 - Limits of potential changes without Charter amendment
 - July 22nd Discussion of proposal by Mayor Tornek and Chair Kennedy
 - Majority vote of the Committee to forward to City Council for consideration

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Public Outreach

 - Public Safety Committee reports July 8th and July 22nd posted
 - Over 600 responses to date
 - Community conversations by members of the Public Safety Committee





- Establish a Police Commission coupled with an Independent Police Auditor
- The Community Police Oversight Commission
 - > Hold public meetings; review/make recommendations regarding the ongoing operations of the Police Department; receive community feedback and complaints; monitor and receive reports on hiring and training; monitor and publish statistics on uses of force, complaints and outcomes; provide input on policy recommendations prior to adoption; receive reports from the Independent Police Auditor regarding critical incidents, policies, and other matters; and produce a publicly available annual report.





Independent Police Auditor

- > Assist Police Commission;
- > Serve as a best-practices advisor;
- > Review investigations of all uses of deadly force and in-custody deaths to determine if the investigations were complete, thorough, objective, and fair;
- Review investigations of personnel complaints of bias-based policing;
- In conjunction with the Commission, recommend changes and additions to Police Department policies, procedures, and officer training;
- > Perform related duties.
- > Engaged through the City Manager's Office

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- Proposal is consistent with 2016 Analysis of Police Oversight Models
 - > A positive step towards greater civilian police oversight
- Can be implemented immediately
- If approved, Commission would be charged with reporting back in advance of 2022 General Election
 - > On any proposed changes in structure that may require amending the City Charter





 That the City Council consider whether to direct the City Attorney to prepare an amendment to the Pasadena Municipal Code, within 30 days, establishing a Community Police Oversight Commission
