

- Nomination Submittal
 - Current owners: Thomas and Joan Barrera
- Constructed in 1908
 - Designed by William F. Thompson
 - Built by S.W. Upton
- Architectural Style
 - Arts & Crafts Period, Two-story Craftsman Style (Vernacular Swiss-Style sub-type)
- Original / Current use
 - Single-family residential



- Located on the west side of S. El Molino Avenue.
- Rectangular flat site.
 - o 12,569 sq/ft lot
 - o 3,511 sq/ft house
- Surrounding context:
 - Madison Heights Neighborhood
 - 969 S. Madison Individual Landmark - Thompson
 - 979 S. El Molino Green and Green
 - o 1015 S. El Molino Wallace Neff

- Represents Context of Arts & Crafts Period Architecture (1904-1914)
 - Previously evaluated under the City's 1999 Arts and Crafts Survey as individually eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places, and more recently identified as contributing to the eligible Madison Heights Landmark District.
- Character Defining Features of this Arts & Crafts Period House:
 - Irregularly shaped plan
 - Extensive use of clinker brick
 - Larger than one- or one-and-one-half-story bungalow
 - Strong emphasis on horizontal lines
 - Low-pitched gabled roofs with wood or composition shingles
 - Walls are covered with over-all wooden shingles. Wide eaves with exposed rafters
 - Full-width front porches, sometimes limited to entry area only, supported by battered or straightsided stone or wooden columns or piers
 - Entrance porch may be recessed or may project from the dwelling
 - Foundations, chimneys and retaining walls of brick or Arroyo stone

Criterion C met:

- Locally significant, intact example of a single-family, twostory Arts and Crafts Period House.
- Retains integrity of Location, Design, Setting, Materials,
 Workmanship, Feeling, and Association.
- Historic Preservation Commission recommended approval at their meeting of August 18, 2020

- Adopt the CEQA determination;
- Affirmatively make the findings as specified in the staff report;
- Recommend that the City Council approve the designation of the property as a Landmark



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
