What Are Magnet Schools

- Magnet schools use a unique theme to increase academic achievement and promote racial and socioeconomic integration.
- 4,340 magnet schools across the United States; 553 in California
- The Magnet Schools Assistance Program (MSAP) authorized by the Every Student Succeeds Act – is the only federal education grant designed specifically to promote educational equity, diversity, and innovation in the classroom.
- The Magnet Schools Assistance Program (MSAP) awarded PUSD \$14.5 million in 2017 to create three new/revised magnet schools and \$7.9 million in 2013 to establish 4 new magnet schools.

Racial and Socioeconomic Integration

 Decades of social science data finds better long-term outcomes for students in racially and socioeconomically integrated learning environments, including improved academic success, social mobility, social cohesion, appreciation for diversity, and long-term health.

(The Century Foundation, 2019)

 "By some researchers' estimates, school integration done well is one of the most cost-effective interventions available for improving outcomes" for students from low-income families-"significantly more effective than providing additional funding to high-poverty schools" (Magnet Schools of America, 2021)

Progress Toward Integration

As overall enrollment has increased, student demographics have shifted closer to represent the diversity of Pasadena Unified School District.

Academic Impact

- Altadena students increased proficiency achievement on state tests from 17.49% to 37.61% in English and from 6.67% to 24.77% in math from 2017 to 2019.
- Washington students increased proficiency achievement on state tests from 15.46% to 20.94% in English and from 10.22% to 13.58% in math from 2017 to 2019.
- Muir more than doubled the percentage of 9th grade students earning college credits from 31% to 69% from 2017 to 2019.
 The overall percentage of students who continued to complete college credits in 10th-12th grades also increased, from 4.69% to 24.36%.
- Testing was paused for 2019-2020 due to COVID-19.


