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Firefighters Are on Duty 24/7

PROVING THEIR "DESIRE TO SERVE, COURAGE TO ACT," more than 150 men and women of our Fire Department keep Pasadenans out of harm's way.

Through an active fire prevention program, crews conduct dry brush surveys and free fire inspections, host demonstrations, investigate suspicious blazes and maintain hundreds of hydrants. The department reviews construction plans, issues fire permits and completes more than 3,700 annual safety inspections.

The department also works daily to update Pasadena's disaster plans and involve neighborhoods in emergency preparedness. During the Great Southern California ShakeOut Nov. 13 to 15, for example, the Fire Department will encourage all individuals, families, businesses and neighborhood associations to conduct earthquake drills and update emergency plans and supplies.

Prevention is key and response is critical. Our firefighters respond to more than 15,000 fires, medical emergencies, accidents and hazardous materials spills each year, and not just in Pasadena. Part of an elite multiagency strike team, our firefighters respond to wildfires throughout the state. Another plus: All firefighters are certified paramedics and are required to complete at least two hours of daily training to maintain their skills.

While they're busy 24/7, our firefighters welcome visitors to stations. If you drop by and a station is closed, it's because firefighters are out on an emergency call. A specially marked telephone outside the door of each station is connected to emergency dispatchers in case you need emergency assistance. Each fire station is also a safe haven where any new parent can surrender a newborn within 72 hours of birth without fear of prosecution.

At the end of your training, with a PERT certificate and safety hat in hand, you'll become part of a vital team – and feel confident that you can handle anything Mother Nature throws your way.

General Plan Update: How's the Weather?

AS THE OLD SAYING GOES, everybody talks about the weather but nobody does anything about it. As Pasadena prepares for the next update of the General Plan, you'll have plenty of opportunities to voice your opinion, become involved and do something about it!

The General Plan is a framework for translating broad community values and expectations into specific strategies for managing growth and enhancing the quality of life. It is reviewed regularly and updated about every five years so it can continue to be a practical document for achieving the community's vision for the future.

Following a series of community meetings that took place over the past few months, the Planning Commission will begin its review of the draft housing element Wednesday, Aug. 13, during a public meeting at 6:15 p.m. in the council chamber at Pasadena City Hall. This element will go to city council this fall for review, and then the draft will be sent to Sacramento for comments before the council approves it.

The city council has convened a task force to oversee the creation of the open space and conservation element. The group, comprised of three commissioners, two conservancy members and four citizen representatives, began meeting this spring. The land use and mobility elements go hand in hand, advocating strategies for identifying where growth should occur and the types of transportation systems that will support this planned growth. The review process for these two elements will begin this fall.

Housing, open space, development, transportation: These are among the hot-button issues discussed in offices, restaurants and front porches across Pasadena. Help decide the future of our community by getting involved!

Help Swat Away West Nile Virus

WARM WEATHER BRINGS OUT THE PESTS, and some mosquitoes may carry the West Nile Virus.

Public Health officials, with the help of Pasadena Police Department helicopters, are looking throughout the community for standing water, treating problem spots with pesticides and setting up mosquito traps to test for the virus.

Pasadena Public Health Department recommends:

- Clean out rain gutters and dump water out of pots.
- Pick up free mosquito-eating fish for ponds or fountains while supplies last by calling 744-6004.
- Pick up leaves, keep your lawn trimmed and make sure the screens on your windows and doors are in good condition.
- If you're outside between dusk and dawn, use an insect repellent that contains DEET and is approved by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Hands Off Our Cans!

WHEN YOU PLACE PLASTIC BAGS, JARS, CANS, BOTTLES and other items in your recycling container, this can mean big money to some crafty violators of the law.

The law helps ensure that many tons of local recyclables are collected, sorted and sold to manufacturers who make new products. This saves space in landfills, supports the city's environmental efforts and helps offset the cost of collection.

Pasadena police regularly patrol for these poachers. You can help by setting your recycling bin at the curb no later than 7 a.m. on collection day. (Most scavengers work after dark or in the early morning.) You can make it even harder for them by putting beverage containers with CRV value at the bottom and piling newspapers and other recyclables on top.

If you see poachers in your neighborhood, never confront them. Instead, call the police at 744-4241 right away with a good description and an address.

DOG FECES ARE UGLY NUISANCES that litter parks and sidewalks, attract flies, spread disease and pollute storm drains.

You can help keep Pasadena clean by picking up after your pet. Buy a scooper at the pet store or use a disposable bag to clean up Rover's droppings wherever they fall. Then simply close the bag and drop it in a city trash receptacle or your own garbage can.

The Pasadena Municipal Code requires that you clean up any droppings within five minutes, whether your pooch leaves them on public or private property.

Sneak a Peak!

EVER WONDER IF YOUR SPRINKLERS ARE UP TO NO GOOD while you're away? This weekend, put "sneak a peak" on your to-do list.

Do a full test run of your irrigation system to see if it's behaving. Do you spot any gushers, leakers or oversprayers? Is the run-time too long? Does the water pool in some areas or run off onto the pavement or, worse, into your home's foundation or basement?

Don't put off getting your sprinklers in line any longer. With little sign of improvement in Southern California's water supply situation, mandatory restrictions and fines on water waste could very quickly become a reality for Pasadena. Be prepared early – and start saving money on your water bill while you're at it.

Ode to a Utility Bill

FELICIA WILLIAMS' RECENT TWO-MONTH UTILITY BILL TOTALED JUST 40 BUCKS. She was so excited that she wrote a letter of thanks to PWP.

"I wanted to share with you that with all the improvements I've made around my house, I've reduced my overall bill by 63%!"

It all started with the yard. Felicia used to set her sprinklers to go off every day, and her water bills were high. After attending one of PWP's water-saving landscaping classes, she converted her front yard to a colorful water-smart garden. She put in a walkway that eliminated a third of her water-guzzling lawn and filled her flower beds with drought-tolerant flowering plants. She capped off excess sprinklers, then took out the parkway grass and replaced it with rosemary, society garlic and Mexican sage.

Felicia moved on to indoor improvements. She installed a dual-flush toilet that saves up to 2,250 gallons per year. Then came a high-efficiency combined washer/dryer that uses 40 percent less energy and 50 percent less water. To complete her improvements, she installed a solar turbine to expel heat from her attic and a 2.8 kilowatt solar photovoltaic system to supply 90 percent of her home's electricity.

For all of her efficiency improvements, Felicia's received \$9,400 in rebates! "I don't think people realize how many resources and dollars can be saved by just doing simple improvements around the house," she says. "Plus it's fun! My friends and neighbors are fascinated by my toilet and washer/dryer."

More Ways to Go Solar For Less



Thinking about getting solar panels but stumped by the upfront costs?

Some companies now offer leasing programs and solar financing options to homeowners, which means you can go solar for little or no money down.

A solar lease, sometimes called a power purchase agreement, enables a homeowner to lease, rather than buy, a system that is installed and maintained by a third-party solar electricity vendor.

The monthly lease payment for solar power and the panels is calculated to be cheaper than what you would normally pay for equivalent power from the grid. Once the lease term is over, you can choose to upgrade to a newer technology or even do a buy-out.

If you prefer to own your panels outright, ask your financial institution about an energy improvement mortgage. A recent study in *Appraisal Journal* showed that for every \$1 decrease in annual energy costs, the market value of the home increases by \$20.

The Pasadena Solar Initiative gives you a big head-start with a \$3.50 per watt rebate in addition to the \$2000 federal tax credit. Both expire in 2009.
