In defense of Pasadena's trees

Dear Mayor Bogaard and Council Members:

It is a very sad day in Pasadena when some of our elected officials choose to kill 43 mature and healthy trees.

Ironically, on January 12, 2009 while you were deciding to decrease the City's canopy, I was at a joint meeting of the Urban Forestry Committee and the Design Commission looking at ways to strengthen the tree ordinance in order to protect as many trees as possible.

While reading the front page of a local newspaper during a recent trip abroad, I saw a beautiful picture of a row of ficus trees being planted on a main boulevard in Casablanca. It made me think of the majestic trees that line several streets in Pasadena.

Two years ago at my urging, The California Releaf Group held their Annual Conference at the Hilton Hotel in Pasadena. More than 250 people from across the nation attended; they were in awe of the beauty and the size of the ficus trees that line Green Street. Months after the Conference was over, I was getting requests from some of the attendees to send them pictures of the ficus trees.

It would be a mistake to remove the ficus trees in favor of replacing them with ginkgo trees. Furthermore, the ginkgo species being planted on Colorado Boulevard grow straight up in the air and do not provide much of a canopy, and frankly the palm trees are not much different from telephone poles to a pedestrian walking beneath them. While this tree scheme may seem advantageous for the audience seated in the grand stands at the Rose Parade in that their view of the floats would not be obstructed, ginkgo and palm trees provide very little shade and overhead cover to our streets for the other 364 days of the year. These ginkgo trees grow slowly and are deciduous for five months of the year from November to March.

Scientific studies indicate that trees with canopies are good for business because they help merchants attract customers. A University of Washington study conducted by Dr. Kathleen L. Wolf found that consumers like to shop and tend to stay longer, and return to businesses that have trees around them. Consumers are also willing to pay for parking and up to 11% more for goods and services when shopping in shaded districts.

Another study conducted by a group from San Jose State University concluded that between 1971 and 1997 an increase in tree canopy meant an increase in profitable stores. This means that Business districts with trees are very inviting and welcoming to the consumers.

Mr. Sheldon and other merchants like him should be made aware of these studies. Maybe then they will view large trees as something more than just a nuisance that drops leaves and hides their signage To find out about the University of Washington's Study go to: www.cfr.washington.edu/research.envmind/

Besides being good for business, trees help the environment in numerous ways:


- They cut our energy cost by lowering our air conditioning bills by as much as 30%
- They increase property values
- They prevent erosion, and reduce runoff from rain waters
- They help reduce smog and noise levels

- They reduce Carbon Dioxide, a major greenhouse gas
- Trees help us moderate the heat-island effect that is caused by so much pavement
- Trees attract birds and other wildlife to our urban setting.



I am sad to see that Mr. Tyler decided not to run for office again. He will be greatly missed. Hopefully his successor will be an even greater champion of our urban forest.


Colorado Boulevard Street Tree Hazards

Dear Mr Bogaard:

Thank you for your response. I have in fact spoken to both Erlinda and our City Engineer, Dan Ricks.

I'm afraid I did not get much satisfaction from the Playhouse District as they wish to move forward with the removal and planting of new trees. In general, as a resident and member of the PDA, I support the efforts of the Playhouse District to improve the area, but, as I previously mentioned, I was surprised to find that it involved wholesale tree removal. Over the last few months, I have noticed trees removed from Oakland Ave / Colorado and from Colorado in front of the Target store.

Mr. Ricks was very helpful and did explain to me that this was indeed part of the City Master Plan from 1996 and that the replacement tree-planting contract is on the City Council's agenda for this next Monday Jan. 12. If the trees were damaging our underground utilities and encroaching on sewer and water lines, I could understand the need for their removal. But they are not. Except for sidewalk damage from some of the trees, it appears to be for largely cosmetic reasons.

The city posted signs on the trees this week, Mr. Ricks estimate is that it will probably be a month before the trees are removed and the new contract is in place. I reviewed the staff report online, the cost for replanting is \$130,000, however I don't know if the contractor or city crews will remove the existing trees.

As this will be on next Monday's Council agenda, I urge you to take steps necessary to ensure that all concerned have an opportunity to re-consider this action, and to reach out to residents for additional public comment before the trees are removed.

I realize I am bringing this to your attention at the eleventh hour and I appreciate your prompt response to my earlier email. It is truly a pleasure to live in this city with our

I recently learned that as part of the city's master plan, it is the city's intention to remove all the mature trees along Colorado Blvd, between Los Robles and Lake Avenue.

I was very disturbed by this when I saw notices posted on the trees early this week.

I understand that this has been part of the city's master plan since 1996, and part of the Playhouse District Association's StreetScape plan, but I wonder how many Pasadena residents realize that this is about to happen, until its too late! - after the fact!.

I recognize the business owners have various concerns about these trees, including the sidewalk damage and dropping berries, but I feel that this is a small price to pay to maintain the beautiful green canopy along the street. The current trees are evergreen, whereas the proposed new gingko trees are deciduous, and will take years to grow into maturity. Those that have been planted to-date have not grown well.

The mature trees we have in our urban forest are truly "green". A single mature tree can absorb carbon dioxide at a rate of 48 lbs./year and release enough oxygen back into the atmosphere to support 2 human beings.

By cutting down these trees, we are not only ruining the view, but damaging the
