I will be unable to attend the 28 April 2011 Environmental Advisory Committee (EAC) meeting; however, I wanted to e-mail my strong support for a ban on single-use plastic shopping bags as well as a ban on single-use paper bags with less than 40% post-consumer recycled content. Also, I believe that a small fee for paper bags is reasonable for those who forget to bring a bag... 5 to 25¢ per paper bag would not be a burden to consumers.

Human nature being what it is, until there is an across the marketplace ban on single-use bags, particularly plastic bags, the populace will continue to throw away \*free\* bags in mass quantities. Discarded plastic bags become hazardous pollutants in the world's oceans and litter our landscapes. Most "plastic" bags are a petroleum-based product. As oil prices go up and finite fossil fuels supplies come to an end, all of the products made with petroleum content need to be reconsidered.

Furthermore, plastic bags persist in the environment, in landfills, and as litter. In the end, plastic bags cost a phenomenal amount to clean up and dispose of in landfills or by barges (some of which illegal dump at sea). Plastic bags floating in the ocean emulate the shape of jellyfish, which causes sea turtles and sea birds to ingest them with fatal results. Bits of micro-trash, including pieces of plastic bags, are also ingested by curious and highly endangered California condors, that in turn feed plastic trash to their young. Crops impacted with plastic trash can kill the chicks of these majestic birds. The list of damage caused by the wasteful and excessive use of plastic bags is extensive. Though there's been a lot of lip service about recycling single-use plastic bags, that has not become a reality. The plastic simply continues to accumulate.

Some will complain that a ban on single-use plastic bags is another step towards a "Nanny State," though this is not the case. It is extremely difficult for ecologically responsible businesses to unilaterally eliminate plastic bags. No one store can afford to pioneer a total ban on single-use plastic bags. If one store attempts to ban the bags or to charge for paper bags, other markets will take advantage and conduct, "We don't charge you for your bag" ad campaigns in competition with the environmentally responsible market or store. Until U.S. citizens become as accustomed to carrying their own shopping bags and paying for paper bags as do the residents of Europe and numerous other countries, folks will complain and believe that they cannot possibly live without their free plastic bags. When I visited Russia and Scotland, I was surprised at first to see everyone carrying their own shopping bags. After a day or two, though, I became used to doing so myself. It was refreshing to see how quickly one can adapt. For that to happen in the USA, a ban that applies equally to all businesses is necessary.

A ban on single-use plastic bags will help train "spoiled" Americans to respect limited resources. The great abundance in this country has led to wasteful packaging, pollution, and costly garbage disposal services. Jobs will be generated as recycled canvas, fold-up rip-stop nylon, and creative "fashion" shopping bags enter the market. A variety of companies will specialize in bags with all sorts of useful and attractive designs, such as the large shoulder bags sold by IKEA stores at low cost. IKEA banned their yellow plastic bags recently and, after a bit of initial grumbling, customers have adapted with no problems.

I urge Pasadena to do what is right for the environment by implementing a full ban on single-use plastic bags with a small fee for single-use paper bags. After a brief period of whining and whinging, we will all adapt. Our communities and the planet will be the better for this decision. It is time for us to join Europe and other countries in reducing plastic waste.

Since I will be unable to be at your April 28, 2011 meeting, I am writing in support of the proposed Pasadena ordinance which would ban plastic carryout bags. Although I am a resident of La Canada Flintridge, I am a frequent shopper in Pasadena.

For the past 15 years, one of my husband's and my volunteer activities has been to pick up trash. As members of the La Canada Flintridge Trails Council, we have participated in regular cleanups of the Pasadena portion of the Flint Canyon Trail. This trail location runs alongside and slightly below the 210 and gets a huge amount of debris blown off the freeway. The trash is mainly comprised of plastic carryout bags and fastfood containers. We have also participated in cleanups along the Arroyo Seco in the Central Arroyo and along portions of the Flint Wash, a tributary of the Arroyo Seco in La Canada Flintridge. Plastic carryout bags litter these areas as well. The bags and other debris which volunteers do not pick up end up in the stream channel and the ocean.

These bags damage the environment and are a visual blight on our beautiful area. We all need to wean ourselves off them and remember to use our reusable bags. The charge for paper carryout bags should help remind us!

On behalf of Seventh Generation Advisors, I respectfully urge you to approve a proposed ordinance restricting the distribution of single-use bags in Pasadena.

In these tough economic times, this proposed ordinance would help lower cleanup and compliance costs. Californians use an estimated 12 billion plastic bags per year. According to CalRecycle, only three percent of these bags are actually recycled. The rest end up in landfills and as litter. Pasadena, along with other municipalities statewide, spends more than \$25 million each year to clean up plastic single-use bags from public places, storm drains, and in our waste stream. Local taxpayer dollars are also spent to comply with Stormwater Permit requirements and other standards in communities with "trash-impaired" waterways as defined under the federal Clean Water Act.

In addition to the economic benefits of a plastic bag ban, there are countless environmental benefits. These include reduced use of natural resources for bag production, reduced wildlife fatalities from strangulation and suffocation, and improved water quality. For all intents and purposes, plastic never biodegrades, but slowly photo degrades. As it photo degrades, plastic film breaks into smaller and smaller pieces which attract surrounding toxins. When mistaken as a food source, these plastic particles form a progressively greater health risk of food chain contamination.

Plastic marine pollution is a global problem with local solutions. Banning the free distribution of bags is widely considered an appropriate and practical legislative action that can protect our environment and save financial resources. The County of Los Angeles, and the City of San Jose, along with other local governments in the region and around the state, have already taken this approach, and I strongly urge you to do the same.

Thank you for your leadership on this issue.

Dear Environmental Advisory Commission:

On behalf of Heal the Bay, we write to urge the City of Pasadena to move forward a single-use bag ordinance that bans single-use plastic bags and places a nominal charge on single-use recycled paper bags. Heal the Bay has been intimately involved in marine plastic pollution issues for many years, including efforts on single-use plastic bag legislation at the local and statewide levels. Based on this experience, we believe that this type of policy is the best approach and will move us towards the most sustainable type of bag, reusable bags.

Plastic bags are the most ubiquitous consumer item designed to last for minutes but persist in our marine environment for hundreds of years. Approximately 60 to 80% of all marine debris and 90% of floating debris is plastic and comes from mostly land-based sources. This plastic pollution poses a persistent threat to marine life. Over 267 species worldwide have been impacted by plastic litter.<sup>2</sup>

The cleanup of litter from single-use bags puts an additional strain on our economy. One study estimated that the taxpayer cost to subsidize the recycling, collection, and disposal of plastic and paper bags could amount to as much as 17 cents per bag.<sup>3</sup> This figure does not include the additional costs that local governments incur annually for cleaning littered streets and beaches and installing trash control devices to comply with total maximum daily load limits (TMDLs) for trash under the Clean Water Act.


Policies that focus only on recycling and education do *not* work. Californians use an estimated 19 billion single-use plastic bags every year. We cannot recycle our way out of this problem and urgent action is needed to help reduce this pollution. Despite efforts to expand recycling programs, less than 5% of single-use plastic bags are currently being recycled.<sup>4</sup> In fact, the bag recycling program established by AB 2449 has not demonstrated any significant increase in

recycling rates. The vast majority of these bags inevitably end up in our landfills or as litter, clogging stormdrain systems, and make their way to our waterways and ocean.

Initially in 2008, the County of Los Angeles looked towards recycling and education to address the problem of plastic bag pollution. Despite efforts to increase recycling and education programs, significant reductions were not been realized so in 2010 the County banned the distribution of single-use plastic bags and placed a charge on recycled paper bags. In total, nine municipalities in California have realized that a single-use plastic bag ban is the best approach and have adopted ordinances (LA County, Marin County, San Jose, San Francisco, Fairfax, Palo Alto, Malibu, Calabasas, Santa Monica).

Pasadena has an opportunity to be a true leader in dealing with plastic bag pollution. The urgency for local government to take action has never been greater. The legacy of our growing addiction to single-use plastic packaging will be felt in the environment for centuries to come. Banning plastic bags in the City of Pasadena will help enhance the city's recreational and tourism economy, improve the quality of life for residents, free valuable landfill space, and restore our environment to a cleaner and healthier state.

Thus, we urge you to move forward with an ordinance to ban single-use plastic bags and place a charge on single-use paper bags.

The City of Pasadena is extending an invitation to you to attend and provide input as staff recommends a proposed ordinance to the Environmental Advisory Commission that would ban plastic carryout bags, impose a ten cent charge on paper carryout bags, and require affected stores to provide reusable bags to customers for sale or at no charge. The stores that would be affected by the proposed ordinance includes large grocers (gross annual sale of \$2 million or more), retailers (at least 10,000 square feet of retail space and has a licensed pharmacy) as well as farmer's markets, drug stores, pharmacies, supermarkets, grocery stores, convenience food stores, food marts, ar liquor stores.

Pasadena is committed to forging policies in support of increased environmental stewardship in partnership with the business community.
