We have a mandate for transparency. Jesus says, "Whatever you have said in the dark will be heard in the light, and what you have whispered behind closed doors will be proclaimed on the housetop" Luke 12:3 The police have not always been transparent. We finally received an extremely redacted version of the police report after a year of many lengthy City Council meetings, thousands of letters, news articles with a national spotlight, marches and a Walk the Second Mile Parade on Palm Sunday led by Anya Slaughter, the mother Kendrec McDade. We arrived in silence with over a hundred pastors and leaders appearing at the spot where Kendrec McDade, 19, lost his life at the hands of two rookie police, who botched the entire ordeal shooting unarmed Kendrec, seven times. Kendrec and others would be with us today if we had a more transparent less exhausting process discussed since 1990. I urge the City to be truly transparent with a commission, an auditor with real authority, fully independent with subpoena power. Independence should also prevent Police Union donations to City Council members, tempting the Public Safety Committee to support the police over the concerns of the community.
