As a result of Bill DiBlasio's decision to close schools again, medical experts, most notably the CDC, Johns Hopkins University and Dr. Fauci are beginning to speak out, schools are the safest place for children. The rate of infection in schools is still %0.15 and schools are not to blame for the 3% of positive cases in New York. Dr Fauci said, "I think one of the things we need to do is to the best of our capability try to keep the kids in school". "The infections that we've identified in schools when they've been evaluated were not acquired in schools, they were actually acquired in the community and in the household," said CDC Director Dr. Robert Redfield. "The truth is for kids K through 12, one of the safest places they can be, from our perspective, is to remain in school."

I am a property owner and a stakeholder in Old Pasadena. I am writing to strongly oppose the adoption of the new guidelines being imposed by Los Angeles County as regards outside/ Al fresco dining for the City of Pasadena.

As you know, due to the visionary and courageous efforts of many members of this Council as well as numerous individuals throughout the City, a new protocol was created to allow restaurants to operate, and to continue to operate outside, using spaces provided by the City of Pasadena, as well as other areas, to allow for outside dining. The result has been a vigorous, and exciting, program of outside dining that has not only saved many food businesses, but has allowed many others to survive and even flourish. Of course, complying with the requirements has been costly. It has meant significant expenditures by the owners of those establishments, re-hiring employees, changing protocols and training, all to make this possible. And it has been successful!

The new regulation being enacted by LA County makes no sense at all. First of all, factually outside dining has been with us for months, with no spikes in the number of cases. The science on this is totally lacking.

Second, there's been no nexus I know of tracing the increased number of cases to people dining all fresco.

Third, it's common knowledge that as temperatures decrease, more people spend more of their time indoors, which is why the number of cases tend to go up during winter, which is why there's been such a huge increase in cases in Europe including Scandinavian countries. That's really the culprit, as it has been for other epidemics (like the flu) when more people congregate indoors due to colder temperatures, and cases go up. Otherwise, if outside dining caused the spike, why wasn't there such a spike in cases two month ago when temperatures were much higher, and more people were dining outside?

Fourth, new rules were just instituted cutting off dining at 10pm and increasing the distance between tables. These changes were JUST instituted! Why should we expect to see improvements in less than a week?

Fifth, if the numbers are spiking, as they appear to be, it's likely the culprit is more and more people socializing indoors in private parties and social gatherings? I'd rather see a mask mandate with some teeth in it or a more rigorous enforcement on private gatherings in excess of 10 people than this cruel and unnecessary restriction on the lifeline that is keeping many hospitality businesses alive!

Outside dining is the lifeblood that is keeping many businesses in Pasadena alive. And not just restaurants - but everyone. You've seen it! The spillover effect on other businesses including

even non-food businesses has been incredible. You helped make this happen! The city helped make this happen. It's been remarkable! Plus, livelihoods have been saved.

Rather than reimposing such draconian conditions and shutting down a whole category of businesses that is helping keep the economy alive, why not impose stricter conditions such as limiting the amount of time people can sit at a table to (say) not more than one hour (I say this not knowing if that number would work for food establishments - ask them first); institute better tracing to find out where people have been getting sick; more rigorously enforce other rules (such as mask wearing at all times when not dining); and finally - finally just wait and keep tracking the numbers.

There will be a vaccine by early next year that has already been proven to be highly (95% and higher) effective and safe. That will be here very soon. Don't wipe out an entire category of businesses in the meantime! Don't kill the golden goose, and make all the hard work turn to dust, and for very little good reason, where the science and the facts do not support it.

Please don't break a butterfly on a wheel!

I understand that the City Council is considering implementing the same shutdown instituted by the County on all restaurant dining at today's meeting.

The county has failed to show evidence that restaurant dining is contributory to the spread of covid beyond normal community spread level. In fact, we restaurant operators that are operating under the current guidelines know that dining at a restaurant (especially outdoors) is a safe alternative to the home dinner parties and underground speakeasy/clubs that will continue to grow with further restrictions in place.

The County has been asked repeatedly to show evidence of restaurants as being the cause of Covid spread, and has refused. These inquiries have come from the press as well as the restaurant community. If there was tangible evidence of outbreaks or widespread cases coming from restaurants, Dr. Ferrer would be shouting it from the rooftops. We believe that their refusal to provide any relationship between restaurant dining and spread is evidence that none exists.

Our restaurant staff has done a phenomenal job of adjusting to the protocols and providing a safe dining experience. However, our current staff is a shell of what it was pre-covid, and we will lose most of our remaining workforce if forced to operate as a carry-out only restaurant. Most sit-down dining concepts are not suited to pivot to a carryout model and maintain significant revenue. Rent and other bills outpace the low revenue and will put us in a position to close operations altogether. All restaurants that occupy a large square footage based on dining are faced with this same problem. The landlords can only go without rent for so long, they face their own foreclosures. And our staff is left with either severely reduced hours or no job at all. Their kids can't go to school, the unemployment system in California is woefully inept. Small business IS the safety net for so many families, and further crippling the economy should not be considered without very accurate information to support such a decision. If that information exists, it has not been provided to the public and should be immediately.
