I am a first-generation African immigrant and DACA recipient who was born in the United Kingdom and raised in the suburbs of Atlanta, Georgia to parents who scrapped their way up the economic ladder to the middle-class. I received my undergraduate education in political science and music from Wesleyan College, in Macon, Georgia. Wesleyan is the first college in the world charted to grant degrees to women, and it was through my time at Wesleyan that I learned the power and importance of community service and engagement with specific regard to women and girls. I went on to earn a juris doctor from William & Mary Law School located in Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia. Colonial Williamsburg — a living museum and shrine to the "Old Dominion" — is one prong of the Historic Triangle upon which the nation was founded and in many regards reflects the attitudes, laws, and policies across the country today. My legal education was a specific experience as a young African woman walking the corridors of Thomas Jefferson's Monticello home as well as serving as a student and active member in the law school he founded. William & Mary has trained citizen lawyers from its founding with the understanding that the William & Mary lawyer wouldn't simply be a legal technician who memorized cases and statues, but would be someone who understood how the law worked in the world and who brought insight and meaning

from a variety of fields and experiences to the profession. This approach to legal service provides the foundation for citizen lawyers, like myself, to lead in their communities, motivated by the desire for progress and by the knowledge that members of the legal profession have a special responsibility that comes with their legal education. The values of leadership, insight, inclusion, community, progress, and justice for all are what distinguishes a citizen lawyer from all others. To that end, in the Autumn of 2017, I founded and managed a pop-up DACA legal clinic which provided approximately \$25,000 worth of legal aid and financial assistance to vulnerable immigrant youth. Also in Autumn 2017, I led a march on Washington and lobbying effort in support of the Dream Act, legislation that would grant citizenship to black and brown undocumented immigrants. Additionally, in the Summer of 2020, I founded the Oduyoye Institute for Fair Police Reporting, a conglomerate of organizations that that work in tandem to end racially-based 911 emergency calls and false or misleading reports to law enforcement against racial and ethnic minorities in America. Within this context, false police reporting may include reports to traditional law enforcement authorities but also to Immigration & Customs Enforcement and School Resource Officers.

11. How would you add value to the Community Police Oversight Commission?

Of special value to the Police Oversight Commission are my interpersonal skills. The many aspects of my identity/background – female, Black, daughter of immigrants, undocumented, sexual harassment survivor – contribute to the invaluable insight and solutions I am poised to bring to the Commission and have allowed me to cultivate compassion for people from diverse walks of life. During my tenure as a Student Prosecutor in the Portsmouth Commonwealth's Attorney's Office, I enforced the law by representing the State of Virginia in various misdemeanor and felony cases. In addition to drafting prosecution memorandum and discovery requests/answers, I was tasked with interviewing victims, witnesses, and police officers. During these interviews, I was at times tasked with questioning children and other vulnerable members of society – including well-meaning law enforcement officers. It was a task I took care to handle with empathy and efficiency. Because of my stellar communication skills, legal and civic education, and intersectional background, I am able to provide a nuanced support to the Commission's efforts.

12. What do you see as the objectives and goals of the Community Police Oversight Commission?

My understanding of the objectives and goals of the Community Police Oversight Commission are as follows:

- To develop and strengthen bilateral police relations including trust and accountability with all communities the police department serves;
- To review and provide input on a variety of matters, including ongoing police operations, hiring, training, and promotions, uses of force, critical incidents, and personnel complaint and outcomes thereon; and

 To identify any major problems with the model/framework of the Commission and work to repair those issues in the years ahead.

13. How would you help achieve these objectives and goals?

I have assisted colleges and universities with traversing high-profile scandals, consulting on various laws and regulations and contributing to a coordinated communication strategy. I believe having a person with this type of experience on the Commission is crucial because the first weapon in any well-stocked war chest is diplomacy and public relations management. However, diplomacy only works if involved actors are competent and make an earnest effort to be as forth coming with pertinent information as legally permissible. I believe I possess the requisite crises management skills to help build a bilateral sense of trust and accountability with all communities the police department serves.

In one such instance in June 2020, at the height of the modern civil rights movement, I lead an investigation where a student, who was expelled from college for posting violent hate speech to social media, filed an effectively false police report against racial minorities in an attempt to mislead the school's disciplining committee into readmitting the student back into the college. The case was quite public as it had made national news and caused a considerable amount of outrage and distrust among alumnae. I signed on with the college as an engagement leader to help construct and execute a communication strategy wherein the goal was to keep the college's alumnae base abreast (to the extent legally permissale) of all developments as well as the school's response to the situation and stance on race-relations generally. This effort built a substantial amount of trust between the college's administration and its various stakeholders. In addition, I was able to employ my legal education and investigative skills to request the body camera footage of the student's false report to law enforcement as well as analyze the data/track trends of the student's hate-driven behavior as aggregated on social media (which effectively serves as time-stamped ledger of any individual's speech and behavior) in addition to interview firsthand witnesses and other affected parties. The investigation culminated in a thorough, credible, substantiated report of my own drafting which was submitted to the governing police department of that community - and which also specifically requested the involved police department to subpoena the student's social media accounts for specific evidence of the student's history of hate speech and behavior. To my understanding, the police department in this instance dismissed this request due to race-based bias and bigotry. If such a community-based police oversight committee existed in this situation - equipped with a subpoena power of its own - that school and surrounding community would function very differently today, as the subpoensed evidence would have served as a basis by which to permanently expel the student at hand and set a precedent for the adjudication of student hate speech violations a the college and perhaps for the rest of the nation moving forward. And all students - past, present, and future - may have been able to walk with their heads held high in dignity knowing that their basic human rights to an education free from violent hate speech would be respected.

My legal education, investigative skills, background in emergency crises management and public relations, and ability to issue spot, propose solutions, and collaborate on winning strategies would be effective in assisting the Commision to achieve its objectives and goals

10. Describe your relevant life experience, professional training, and/or education in the following areas: Police Activity/Law Enforcement/Criminal Justice System; Social Justice; Mental Health; and Anti-Bias Curriculum/Studies and/or Working with Diverse Populations:

As a researcher and founder of Public Works for the past 25 years, I have led and participated in multiple research and evaluation projects in the areas of criminal justice, social justice, and mental health. Using qualitative and quantitative methodologies, I have studied organization implementing innovative practices in these areas targeting diverse populations and system change. In conducting these research projects, I have looked at best practices and lessons learned from non-profits, government and community stakeholders attempting to implement similar projects. My research work has been conducted at the federal, state, county and city level.

After learning and partnering with PUSD on high school dropout recovery, in 2008 I created Learning Works (LW), a charter school for traditionally underserved, high-risk students in grades 6-12 who have withdrawn from mainstream education. The youth we serve would inaccurately be called "at-risk." They are, in fact, "in crisis" or have already demonstrated a behavior or condition that exceeds at-risk, such as becoming pregnant, dropping out of school or entering the juvenile delinquency system. In partnership with Homeboy Industries, our school is located at the original Job for the Future site on First Street in Boyle Heights. Our work at LW is viewed as ground breaking focused on students 14-21 years that are system impacted and living in poverty. Through life experience, training and trial and error, I have created new approaches to reach diverse population we serve in the areas of mental health, probation, and curriculum with a focus on social justice. In doing so, I have knowledge and experience in police activity, law enforcement, criminal justice, and child welfare services.

In addition to having the school at Homeboy Industries, I was asked to join three years ago as the Chief of Education and Research which has provided me with new experiences and trainings in mental health practices, implicit bias, domestic violence and gang violence. As the largest gang intervention program in the nation, HBI provides hope, training, and support to formerly gang-involved and recently incarcerated men and women, allowing them to redirect their lives and become contributing members of our community. This has provided me with exposure to working with a very diverse population with 8000 clients walking through our doors from a youth on probation to adult on parole after serving 22 years (see letter of recommendation attached from Father Greg Boyle).

11. How would you add value to the Community Police Oversight Commission?

In my current employment, I am charged with evaluating case files and creating sentencing recommendations. This requires me to put aside any sort of bias and objectively analyze evidence and create recommendations based on that analysis. I go through over 40 hours of training each year through my employer. I am a licensed attorney and have spent the last decade refining my skills at objective and logical analysis. My employment also includes mental health training. Often, I am interacting with individuals who have drug dependency issues and mental health issues.

In the Fall of 2019, I attended Pasadena's Citizens Police Academy. In light of more and more police controversy, I wanted to learn as much as I could about the experience of the PPD. I learned so much and used my analytical training to see where improvements can be made and where Chief Perez has already made huge strides.

Through my work with the SGV LGBTQ Center, I have attended many anti-bias and diverse population trainings. The LGBTQ community is so incredibly diverse, and often that diversity is not readily apparent.

11. How would you add value to the Community Police Oversight Commission?

I bring the knowledge, experience, and ability to look at a specific set of facts and make an unbiased recommendation. I also have the ability to analyze a set of facts against a certain evidentiary standard. For example, the difference between the use of deadly force being reasonable or being necessary can be a very fine line. Knowing how to approach a situation with that in mind is incredibly important and I can do that. I can also articulate why a certain scenario meets or fails to meet that standard.

I also bring the experience of a member of the LGBTQ community. This is a community that still experiences large amounts of violence and persecution. The first trans death of 2021 happened on January 11 (Davarea Alexander). A hate group has been more and more vocal in our neighboring city of El Monte. It is imperative that the LGBTQ community have a place on this committee.

12. What do you see as the objectives and goals of the Community Police Oversight Commission? One objective or goal of the Committee is an effort of the PPD to gain the trust of the community it serves. It also needs to establish accountability for when a police officer makes a mistake. The committee is a body that needs to be free of bias and maintain objective accountability.

13. How would you help achieve these objectives and goals?

I would achieve these goals by contributing my objective and analytical expertise. I will continue to expand my tools by attending more trainings and continuing this education. I am also very receptive to feedback and making the effort to address that feedback.

When I started my career in the non-profit sector more than 18 years ago at the National Conference for Community and Justice (NCCJ), I was grounded in a philosophy and methodology focused on fighting racism, bigotry and bias through education, training and conflict resolution. Throughout my career, it has been incredibly important to weave my knowledge and experience in anti-blas education and training into all aspects of my social justice advocacy. While at All Saints Church, I have had the opportunity to center my multiculturalism education through VISIONS, Inc. I am currently supporting our local affiliate of Planned Parenthood by facilitating efforts and leading training for staff and the board of directors on diversity, equity and inclusion.

In the more than ten years that I have been working within the Pasadena community, I have been very active with a variety of local social justice efforts such as: campaigning to increase the minimum wage; supporting efforts to protect undocumented immigrants; joining initiatives to garner more affordable housing in the city; fighting for an increase to access to free and affordable healthcare; working to educate the public on gun safety and gun violence prevention; and advocating for the needs of the unhoused in our community, just to name a few.

In 2013, I began my journey in understanding the challenges of law enforcement and its relationship to the people they are entrusted to protect and serve. I have met with many residents of Pasadena over the years, listened to the stories of those who had negative encounters with our police department. I have also met with Pasadena police officers and learned about their experiences out in the field. I have been privileged to attend many workshops and conferences on policing and police/community oversight provided by organizations such as the ACLU, LMU Law School, and the National Association for Civilian Oversight in Law Enforcement (NACOLE). I am also an avid reader of books, news articles, and essays on the issues of policing and community/police relations. All of these experiences has positively impacted my participation in the Coalition for Increased Civilian Oversight of Pasadena Police (CICOPP), as well as my membership on the Pasadena Police Chief's Advisory Committee.

Having earned an undergraduate degree in Psychology, I have a particular interest in mental health. I was proud to have served on the Pasadena Mental Health Advisory Committee when it was chaired by Victor Cass of the Pasadena Police Department, and then to have served on the board of our local Chapter of NAMI. As I currently work for a community of faith that provides pastoral care to our members and others in need, I am often in a position to provide mental health

resources. Therefore, I have extensive knowledge of our local mental health service providers. Additionally, I have received training in trauma informed care.

Finally, I have a deep passion and commitment for improving the lives of our community members and for making our neighborhoods more safe and healthy for all, not just some. I have dedicated my entire career to social change movements and given twenty years of my time and skills to fighting just causes, always working with and for diverse populations. I see the movement of our time as the fight for racial justice and racial equity, acknowledging how white supremacy impacts all areas of our social lives and government operations - from the economy, education, housing, public safety and law enforcement.

11. How would you add value to the Community Police Oversight Commission?

I will add value to the Commission because I have the ability to work well with others and work across differences. I understand that as we work together, there will be times when we have disagreements and that we can work through them to achieve common ground and greater understanding. I can help bridge the divide that exists in our community as it relates to perceptions and opinions of the police department because I am willing to have uncomfortable conversations, hold tensions, and work through the challenges to find ways to create mutual respect and appreciation. I am not afraid to speak truth to power and will always remain committed to pushing each of us in positions of public trust to do better by our community.

I will add value to the Commission because I understand that Black, Indigenous, Persons of Color have experienced the brunt of police brutality and abuse in our nation and that there are unfortunate stories of this in our own city that must be redressed. This is not just a matter of history — we have current concerns that harken our attention.

I will add value to the Commission because I have a demonstrated history of working on police reform in Pasadena. I am constantly trying to make our police department better while also aiming to improve our police/community relations. I am devoted to the efforts to ensure that our law enforcement officials never again unjustly abuse or kill Black and Brown community members.

I will also add value to the Commission because I am Latina, first generation American, and fluent in Spanish. I understand the unique experience of growing up in an immigrant family and maintaining my Colombian culture and traditions while incorporating American culture. I have lived experiences with being a member of marginalized communities and I know how to navigate communicating and working in these communities, as well as with communities with power.

12. What do you see as the objectives and goals of the Community Police Oversight Commission?

The goal of Community Police Oversight Commission is to work with the public, City officials, and Independent Police Auditor to increase mutual trust and respect between the police department and community through transparency and accountability. With the oversight provided by the Commission, the Pasadena Police Department will become a more fair, just and valued community partner in serving our residents and guests, and a model of 21st century leadership to other law enforcement agencies across the nation.

There will be numerous objectives that the Commission will need to embark on in order to achieve the aforementioned goal. These objectives will need to be strategically planned according to a timeline that honors the sense of urgency on some topics and the Commission's capacity in its early stages. In other words, I am well aware that at least for the first year of the Commission's existence, Commissioners and the newly hired Independent Police Auditor (IPA) will be getting oriented to the work.

That being said, I believe that the following topics will need to be addressed by the Commission (in no particular order):

AB 392 and Use of Force: The Commission must work with the IPA and PPD to constantly review policies such
as its "use of force" policy (without depending on Lexipol for updates) and work to ensure that the policy reflects
best practices and the needs of the community. The Commission must ensure that the department is not merely

- following the law, but also taking into the account the public's need for trust and security in its transactions with the PPD, while also taking into account officer safety. Careful examination must be taken with the department's "lethal use of force."
- Critical Incidents: The Commission must work with the IPA and PPD to review critical incidents such as Officer Involved Shootings (OIS) and ensure that policies are adhered to and that the public is informed about the details of each case in the most honest and transparent manner that is legally permitted.
- Officer Accountability: The Commission must work with the PPD to effectively communicate with the public
 when and how officers who are involved in policy violations and incidents that attract public scrutiny are
 disciplined and held accountable for their actions, as well as adjudicated under the law.
- 4. Civil Liberties: The Commission must work with the IPA and PPD to protect the public's civil liberties by working with partners to create policies and procedures for law enforcement agents as they engage with the public. There should be a careful examination of current practices of using automated license plate readers, and surveillance technology. The examination must consider a value/risk assessment of each strategy that the police utilize in the performance of their duties.
- 5. Violence Prevention/Intervention: The Commission must work with the PPD, other City Officials and key community partners to create programming and initiatives that focus on violence prevention, understanding that intervention is the last resort. Because we cannot enforce our way out of social dilemmas such as gang violence, there is a critical role that law enforcement agencies can play in working towards the prevention of violence.
- 6. Alternatives to Enforcement: The Commission must work with the PPD, other City Officials and key community partners to establish alternatives to law enforcement responses to matters related to mental health crisis, homelessness, and minor disputes. The PPD is currently working on such an effort and the Commission could compliment and advance the creation of alternative strategies to respond to calls for service. This would also include a careful review of the department's budget and provision of recommendations for budgetary changes.
- 7. Racial and Identity Profiling Act (RIPA): The Commission must work with the PPD to ensure that we are compliant with California State Law and that the police department takes measures to eliminate racial and identity profiling, and improve diversity and racial and identity sensitivity in law enforcement. This work includes making sure we set in place training and practices regarding stops, and that the technology we use supports the department in acquiring the data needed for submission to the California Department of Justice. A key component to this effort will be to accompany the quantitative data accumulated with qualitative data about the other social factors related to all law enforcement stops.

13. How would you help achieve these objectives and goals?

My professional career has extended over 35 years in the areas of paper and printing sales and the nonprofit industries. These years of experience working with people in a business and community-based settings have helped me engage with all types of individuals. My experience with law enforcement has come through my interactions and community involvement with three separate agencies. In 1995, I was a graduate of The Pasadena Citizens Police Academy. The interaction with members of The Pasadena Police Department and the community and professional leaders was a memorable experience. My volunteer activity with PPD continued over years by serving on several Disciplinary Review Boards.

It was my positive experience with the PPD Citizens Police Academy; I accepted an invitation in 2014 to be a part of the FBI Los Angeles Citizens Academy where I received a detailed understanding of the FBI's programs and initiatives as well as participated in an open exchange of information between the FBI and community representatives.

As Executive Vice President at Brotherhood Crusade, which is known for its social justice and advocacy history, I work closely with trauma-informed youth and young adults some of them have been involved in the Los Angeles County juvenile justice system. We also work young people to address and minimize the risk factors that contribute most to youth joining gangs, engaging in delinquency. In 2017, I worked closely with the Los Angeles Police Department to get them to customize an 8 (Saturday) program for our youth program participants.
