BACKGROUND - WHY CENSUS DATA

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- City Charter Section 1201: "The City Council shall, by ordinance, establish seven districts which shall be used for all elections of Councilmembers. Said districts shall be as nearly equal in population as practicable and such redistricting shall be in compliance with applicable laws."
- California Elections Code Section 21621(a): "...following each federal decennial censusthe
 council shall, by ordinance or resolution, adopt boundaries for all of the council districts of the
 city so that the council districts shall be substantially equal in population as required by the
 United States Constitution."
- California Elections Code Section 21621(a)(1): "Population equality shall be based on the total
 population of residents of the city as determined by the most recent federal decennial census for
 which the redistricting data described in Public Law 94-171 are available."





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- Population equality ≠ mathematical precision
- Under federal law, "substantially equal" allows some deviation from absolute equality
 - > 10% population differences are presumptively okay
 - Based on legitimate redistricting considerations
 - Larger deviations might be okay, but not presumptively so
 - > Deviations exceeding 16.4% probably never justifiable

Do not bypass a nearby population to take in a more distant population



AMERICAN COMMUNITY SURVEY DATA


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- ACS data is a sample survey that is conducted every month of every year by the US Census Bureau and is used to describe the characteristics of a population
- Random sampling of addresses (approximately 3.5 million) in the 50 states, District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico
- ACS asks questions about topics not on the decennial census, such as education, employment, and housing
- The sample survey data is weighted according to population estimates






MOUSEHOLD INCOME \$75,000 OR MORE






ADULTS WITH COLLEGE DEGREES






RENTER OCCUPIED HOUSING UNITS






OVER AGE 5 – LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENCY
