Policy Goal

- Reflects the current understanding of what best promotes positive child outcomes
- Creates an opportunity to bridge and focus the efforts of multiple sectors, including early childhood education, child welfare, health, law enforcement and community building
- Creates the conditions for a more comprehensive and effective approach to improve children's life and life-long health and well being

Meeting Topics

- Reviewed the implementation of the existing the Plan and the existing data on Pasadena's young children and their families.
- Revisited the Vision, Master Plan Elements and infrastructure to support implementation.
- Revisited each of the Eight Building Blocks in the adopted Plan.
- Will review local, county, and state funding and early childhood priorities and strategies.
- Will review the role of the Office of the Young Child and its priorities in order to recommend improved systematic integration across the community.

Progress to date

- Maintain the Systems Approach
 - There is consensus that the <u>systems approach</u> from the 2015 Policy remain.
- Revision of the Core Elements
 - Policy elements and descriptions were reviewed and revised using the systems approach lens.

Aligned In Vision, Linked in Action

- Consensus was reached that <u>building and sustaining partnerships</u> is critical to working towards a shared vision for children and families.
- The role of the City as <u>convenor</u> of the larger community is necessary to build and maintain these partnerships and a shared commitment to the vision.
- The City should also take on the <u>role of catalyst</u> for new approaches and ideas to take root.
- <u>Finally, the City should work to share</u> what is being done and learned throughout the City stakeholders.

Data Collection and Measures of Success

- It remains necessary to <u>capture data and information</u> on children and families' health and well-being, the types of services and who is receiving what service, how much and where, as well as understanding families' experiences of services and other community supports.
- There was strong agreement that the city must move beyond data collection and focus on <u>data use</u> - which must include improving data dissemination and visualization that emphasizes improving stakeholders' ability to use data to drive decision-making and improved impact.
- This element is collectively viewed as the <u>accountability element</u> for the policy.
 To that end, specific responsibilities for data collection, dissemination and support with its use should be identified and recommended within the new policy.

Strengthening Families

- Strengthening Families and adopting a Protective Factor Framework becomes the key implementation strategy.
 - Under the <u>Strengthening Families</u> umbrella, Task Force members reached consensus around the need to set a policy that fosters organizing the work around linking and integrating the key areas of health and emotional well-being, and quality early childhood settings and neighborhood supports.
 - By putting these together, we are emphasizing the need to <u>improve both access to</u> <u>services and outcomes for all children and families</u>. The aim is to link health services, neighborhood services, city services, pre-school-related services using each as key touchpoints offering a no wrong door approach to extend the reach of the full array of available family and child services and supports to all Pasadena's families.

Transition from Pre-School to Kindergarten

- A focus on the effective transition from Pre-School to Kindergarten is being considered.
- · This is viewed as a critical transition in a young child's development.
- In partnership with the school district, childcare centers, early childhood leaders and teachers, and parents and families, the task force has proposed that the city will continue to foster
 - Continuous communication among the family, the school, and early childhood providers, public and private,
 - · Helping families access and understand school registration processes,
 - · Making children and parents comfortable and welcome in the new school environment, and
 - Sharing pre-school experience information at the right time with the family and the child's kindergarten teacher.

Inclusion of over-arching Principles & Values

- Task Force members have emphasized the need to be explicit throughout the policy in addressing the issues of
 - Racism
 - Social Justice
 - · Economic Instability
 - Health Disparities
 - · Culturally Specific Programs for English Language Learners/All Learners
 - The Impact of Violence on Children and Families
- There was consensus that these challenges/issues should be included in and across the
 policy as key strands to be addressed throughout the implementation of the core elements.
- There was consensus that including these issues in and across the policy requires that implementation and focus on these areas must be included as part of the Data Collection -Measures of Success instruments and accountability process.
