

I also currently work at Planned Parenthood Pasadena & San Gabriel Valley, a local health care provider which serves underserved community members.

When I started my career in the non-profit sector more than 19 years ago at the National Conference for Community and Justice (NCCJ), I was grounded in a philosophy and methodology focused on fighting racism, bigotry and bias through education, training and conflict resolution. Throughout my career, it has been incredibly important to weave my knowledge and experience in anti-bias education and training into all aspects of my social justice advocacy. While at All Saints Church, I had the opportunity to center my multiculturalism education through VISIONS, Inc.

In 2013, I began my journey in understanding the challenges of law enforcement and its relationship to the people they are entrusted to protect and serve. I have met with many residents of Pasadena over the years, listened to the stories of those who had negative encounters with our police department. I have also met with Pasadena police officers and learned about their experiences out in the field. I am also an avid reader of books, news articles, and essays on the issues of policing and community/police relations. All of these experiences has positively impacted my participation in the Coalition for Increased Civilian Oversight of Pasadena Police (CICOPP), as well as my membership on the Pasadena Police Chief's Advisory Committee.

Having earned an undergraduate degree in Psychology, I have a particular interest in mental health. I was proud to have served on the Pasadena Mental Health Advisory Committee, and then to have served on the board of our local Chapter of NAMI. I am not afraid to speak truth to power and will always remain committed to pushing each of us in positions of public trust to do better by our community.
