RE: Mental and Behavior Health Legislation - Improving and Expanding Access to Programs and Services – SUPPORT IN CONCEPT

Dear Senator Eggman:

On behalf of the City of Pasadena, we recognize there are several barriers to mental health care, including stigma, cost and access to appropriate care, which make it difficult for many individuals to achieve their best mental health. To address these issues, the City of Pasadena supports the concepts for legislation that improves access to programs and services for mental and behavioral health, places mental health on par with physical health services and offers frameworks and tools that provide care and support to people with mental health and substance use disorders.

Senate Bills 929, 1035, 965, 970, 1154, 1227, 1238 and 1416, are a package of mental and behavioral health related legislation that begins to take a holistic view of our behavioral health continuum and provide increased opportunities and incentives for early intervention and prevention. Pasadena supports efforts to modernize portions of our treatment system to ensure anyone in need can receive the care that they need to provide for their own needs, safety, and dignity.

Senate Bill 1338 - Community Assistance, Recovery and Empowerment Program – is the proposed framework to deliver mental health and substance use disorder services to the most severely impaired Californians who too often languish, such has those suffering in homelessness, without the treatment they desperately need. While Pasadena supports the overall intent of the bill, additional stakeholder input is needed to ensure the objectives can be achieved without further burdening the already-strained courts and mental health systems in our state. We look

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forward to continued efforts to amend and modify the legislation with hopes of receiving a coalition of broad support.

Finally, Pasadena encourages additional legislation that helps support and expand the mental health and behavioral health workforce, training for first responders to engage safely with people living with mental illness and encouraging age-appropriate mental health education.

We acknowledge that this legislation is still a work in progress, and we are committed to working toward a framework that is more feasible, sustainable and ultimately strengthens mental and behavioral health services for some of the most vulnerable individuals in our communities.
