Dear City Clerk Mark Jomsky,

I am a Neurologist in Pasadena, serving the community for the past 15 years. I am also an Iranian Jew who immigrated to US in 1991 with my parents after tolerating years of persecution and anti-Semitic activities in Iran. My story is not unique, there are many members like me. The root of all concerns is not Islam or true Muslim, the issue are those radical terroristic groups such as Hamas, hijacking religion and murdering Jews on October 7th and continuing with their terrorist ideas to created hate, division and chaos. They have no intention of returning innocent hostages after their raped women, shot teenagers in the back and beheaded children in front of their parents. They are not peace loving, humanity compatible groups. I hope for the sake of my family and other Jewish members in the community who have served and lived a quiet life, you do the right thing.

I am writing you today to urge you not to adopt any biased "ceasefire" resolution that would fuel divisions and hate in our community, while harming efforts to end the horrific October 7th War.

I want an end to the fighting and suffering in Gaza and Israel, as I'm sure you do. However, biased "ceasefire" city council resolutions have been shown to have no impact on this complex conflict. In fact, what the Jewish community has witnessed is that resolutions like this actually fuel more hate towards Jews and anyone else who does not believe cities should weigh in on international issues. There are many examples of such hate, including in the Oakland and Long Beach city councils.

I feel it is important to remind you of the following:

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3. There would be a permanent ceasefire tomorrow if Hamas would release all hostages, lay down its arms, and allow Israelis and Palestinians to rebuild in peace and security.

The type of "ceasefire" you are being pressured to support would not bring a just or lasting peace. What it would do is help Hamas, a genocidal terrorist group, maintain its grip on power in Gaza and continue its endless war against Israel. While I do not believe municipal governments should address international affairs at all, if you choose to adopt a resolution on this issue it must include a clear call for Hamas to release all hostages and surrender now.

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Dear City Council Members:

I urge you: *please* do not adopt a ceasefire resolution.

It will have no impact on the conflict itself and will instead sow divisions and put your Jewish constituents at risk. The Israel-Hamas War led to an immediate and alarming spike in antisemitic hate crimes here in the United States. The ADL has tracked the data for over 40 years and is seeing the highest rates of antisemitic hate crimes and antisemitic sentiments that have been seen in decades. This rise in antisemitism hits close to home. In Los Angeles County, synagogues have received bomb threats, Jews have been attacked on the streets, Jewish business have been defaced, Jews have been subjected to antisemitism in their workplaces and schools, have been targeted online, etc. This rise in antisemitism and antisemitic hate crimes have left the Jewish community shaken.
