In response to Councilmember Hampton's inquiry regarding public comment and retaining water for firefighting purposes, Kris Markarian Acting Public Works Director, reported that the purpose of the stormwater capture project is to treat the water and percolate it to the Raymond Basin, not for firefighting purposes.

Councilmember Jones returned to the meeting at 6:49 p.m.

#### **OLD BUSINESS** RECREATION AND PARKS COMMISSION: PROPOSED OPTIONS TO RECOGNIZE RHYTHM AND BLUES (R&B) MUSIC GROUI **TROOP** (Public Works Dept.)

Recommendation: It is recommended that the City Council:

(1) Find that the proposed options in the agenda report to recognize Troop are categorically exempt from the California Environmenta Quality Act (CEQA) under Section 15061(b)(3), "Common Sense exemption that CEQA only applies to projects that have the potentia for causing a significant effect on the environment; as well as unde Section 15301 as a minor alteration of an existing facility with ne change in capacity; and

(2) Review and select amongst four proposed options to recognize rhythm and blues (R&B) music group, Troop; or

(3) Provide alternate direction.

Recommendation of the Recreation and Parks Commission: OI October 1, 2024, four proposed options were presented to the Recreation and Parks Commission along with relevant background information. The Commission unanimously supported Option 'D' te install a plaque on the exterior wall at the entrance to the Pasadena Civic Auditorium.

Kris Markarian, Acting Director of Public Works, presented PowerPoint presentation on the item, provided background information on the project and the process, presented recognition options, and responded to questions.

City Clerk Jomsky reported that 3 letters advocating for the City Counc to honor Troop in various ways (renaming the dance room at the Jackie Robinson Center, a street named after the group, a plaque at Pasaden High School, and/or by placing a plaque at the Civic Center), and 1 letters in opposition to the City renaming Dayton Street, including letter/petition with 39 signatures in opposition to the City renamin-Dayton Street, were received by the City Clerk's Office, distributed to the City Council, posted online, and made part of the public record fc this item.

Rose Robinson, Pasadena resident, spoke in opposition to renaming a dance room at Jackie Robinson Center and advocated for the City to honor Troop in another way.

Allen Shay, Pasadena resident, advocated for the City Council to honor Troop and provided various options to consider.

The following individuals spoke in support of honoring Troop with a plaque at the Civic Auditorium and provided comments:

Caprice Lee, residence not stated Aaron Gallardo, Castle Green HOA David Woodbury, Pasadena resident

Michelle Hooker, Pasadena resident, spoke in opposition to renaming Dayton Street to honor Troop.

Olden Denham, Pasadena resident, expressed gratitude for the City Council considering ways to honor Troop.

Keisha Wilkins, residence not stated, thanked City staff for thei efforts in identifying various options to honor Troop.

Councilmember Masuda thanked City staff for their efforts and collaborating with Ms. Wilkins, and advocated for honoring Troop with a plaque at the Civic Auditorium.

Councilmember Jones expressed support for honoring Troop with a plaque at the Civic Auditorium and also suggested that Troop pursual some type of recognition at Pasadena High School, which has a wall o honor for notable people that attended the school.

Councilmember Hampton echoed support for honoring Troop with a plaque at the Civic Auditorium and a dedication at Pasadena High school. He also stated his disappointment that the process and policy for dedications was changed only after the applicant had followed the previously established unofficial procedure.

Councilmember Williams spoke in support of a plaque to commemorate Troop, stated her preference for the plaque to be placed at Centra Park, site of the musical group's rehearsals and past performances and advocated for the plaque to include historical information on Troop as a learning opportunity for the public.

Discussion ensued regarding the design process of the plaque, hov City staff is working with the Parks and Recreation Commission, as wel as the Pasadena Center Operating Company, to place the proposed plaque, and the nexus between Troop and Central Park. Councilmember Hampton suggested City staff look into creating ; webpage identifying all of the City's plaques and places of interest a a visitor's tool, and to centralize information on all commemorations in Pasadena on dedicated City website page.

Following discussion, it was moved by Councilmember Masuda seconded by Councilmember Jones, to approve the stat recommendation to honor Troop with a plaque at the Civic Auditorium as well as a friendly amendment to honor Troop with a second plaque with robust historical information on the music group at Central Park (Motion unanimously approved) (Absent: Mayor Gordo)

# SUPPORT OF PROPOSITION 36, "ALLOWS FELONY CHARGES AND INCREASES SENTENCES FOR CERTAIN DRUG AND THEF" CRIMES" ON THE NOVEMBER 6, 2024 STATE GENERAL ELECTION BALLOT (Office of the City Manager)

**<u>Recommendation</u>**: It is recommended that the City Council:

(1) Find that the action proposed in the agenda report is covered by the "Common Sense" exemption set forth in State CEQA Guideline: Section 15061(b)(3) as CEQA only applies to projects that may have a significant effect on the environment; and

(2) Support Proposition 36 on the November 5, 2024, state ballot.

Alex Hernandez, Assistant to the City Manager, presented a PowerPoint presentation on the item, provided a brief overview o Proposition 36, and responded to questions.

In response to Councilmember Lyon's inquiry regarding how Proposition 36 aligns with the City's legislative platform, Assistant to the City Manager Hernandez reported that the areas in alignmen pertain to public safety and quality of life issues.

In response to Councilmember Williams' inquiry regarding financia costs of implementation of Proposition 36, City Manager Márque: reported that the County and/or State could potentially face costs fo prosecution and providing a defense.

Councilmember Rivas expressed concerns related to the unfunder indirect costs that the measure would create, such as treatment fo certain individuals with drug offenses.

In response to Councilmember Hampton's inquiries regarding drug offenses, City Prosecutor Tim Wellman reported that the if Proposition 36 were passed by voters, the District Attorney's Office would have the discretion to charge a person in possession of illegal drugs as a felony if the person has two or more prior drug possessions, or other drug related offenses.

## REPORTS AND COMMENTS FROM COUNCIL COMMITTEES

Legislative Policy Committee Vice Mayor Madison expressed concerns regarding Proposition 36 stating that it does not provide adequate funding for treatment, and may be unfairly applied to individuals based on race and ethnicity, and potentially lead to unfortunate consequences.

The following individuals spoke in opposition of the proposed state ballot measure Proposition 36 and/or provided other various comments:

Margaret diZerega, Vera Institute of Justice Selina Ho, Vera Institute of Justice Jess Farris, ACLU of Southern California

City Clerk Jomsky reported that two letters advocating for the City Council to oppose Proposition 36 and providing comments on the matter, and two letters (submitted for the Legislative Policy Committee meeting) advocating for the City to oppose Proposition 36 which risks budget cuts from LA County Programs, were received by the City Clerk's Office, distributed to the City Council, posted online, and made part of the public record for this item.

Councilmember Lyon expressed opposition Proposition 36, stating that the measure is a reaction to the uptick in shoplifting and property crimes in the past two years, noting that property crimes are still at a historically low point.

MOTION: Following discussion, it was moved by Councilmember Lyon, seconder by Councilmember Rivas, to oppose state Proposition 36.

In response to Councilmember Masuda's inquiry regarding why there should be support for Proposition 36, City Attorney Bagneris noted tha supporting arguments for the measure state that tougher laws and penalties may serve as a deterrent to committing crimes. Chie Assistant City Prosecutor Wellman added that under Proposition 36 individuals may be given an admonition, while if an individual is convicted of selling drugs such as fentanyl, and someone dies fron those drugs, that person could be prosecuted for second degree murder.

Discussion ensued regarding the opportunity of treatment, lack o funding for treatment, wobblers, and the District Attorney's policies.

SUBSTITUTE MOTION: Following additional discussion, it was moved by Councilmembe Williams, seconded by Councilmember Hampton, to take no position (Motion unanimously approved) (Absent: Mayor Gordo)
