City Council,

Regardless of the day of the week that City Council meets, the meetings need to start **on time**. At a recent City Council meeting it was noted that Council members would finally discuss the late start of meetings at the August 17 meeting, but the word “late” isn’t even in the staff report and it instead notes that "Members of the City Council have expressed challenges with regular meetings on Monday evenings." There's no mention of the fact that meetings in 2026 have started an average of 30 minutes or that meetings started an average of 29 minutes late in 2025. Maybe switching to a different day is intended to improve punctuality but that is not stated anywhere in the report. It's instead focused on the need to make the meeting night more convenient for Council members. There's no acknowledgement of the inconvenience caused to community members who have to wait and wait and wait for meetings to start.

I have previously provided data documenting this, along with data showing that this is NOT THE NORM for other cities in Los Angeles County. Updated data is attached. I also collected signatures from people while waiting for Council to start about the need for meetings to start on time. (Note: I only did this for a short while or else there’s be way way more signatures. No one said no.)

I also ask City Council to address the frequent cancellation of Committee meetings. As Council Member Cole noted in his most recent newsletter, Council Committees are "an important place for strategic discussions and public input." He further notes how one Committee became a "forum for rigorous oversight and in-depth discussion of issues", and another has "taken up some controversial issues." I wholeheartedly agree - and that is why it is so disappointing the so many Committee meetings are cancelled - sometimes just hours or even minutes before they are scheduled to start. Pasadena is facing many pressing issues that cannot be properly addressed unless relevant Committees actually hold their meetings.

I encourage Council to create an easily accessible, public-facing dashboard that includes

- Scheduled and actual start times for general City Council meetings and Committee Meetings
- Number of meetings cancelled by each Committee
- The reason (e.g., Thanksgiving, lack of quorum) for Committee meeting cancellations
- The names of the Council members who cannot attend and the reason (e.g. illness, personal travel) when Committee meetings are cancelled due to lack of quorum
- Data on Council Member arrivals after the scheduled start time
- Data on Council Members leaving early, including when their departure forces an early adjournment due to a loss of quorum

Council Members were elected to serve the community. Community members should be able to easily access information on whether their Council Member is meeting the most basic criteria for the job – showing up. The community members who show up to City Council meetings and to Committee meetings are ALSO busy with jobs, family responsibilities, etc. We are simply asking that meetings start on time and that Committee meetings are held as scheduled.

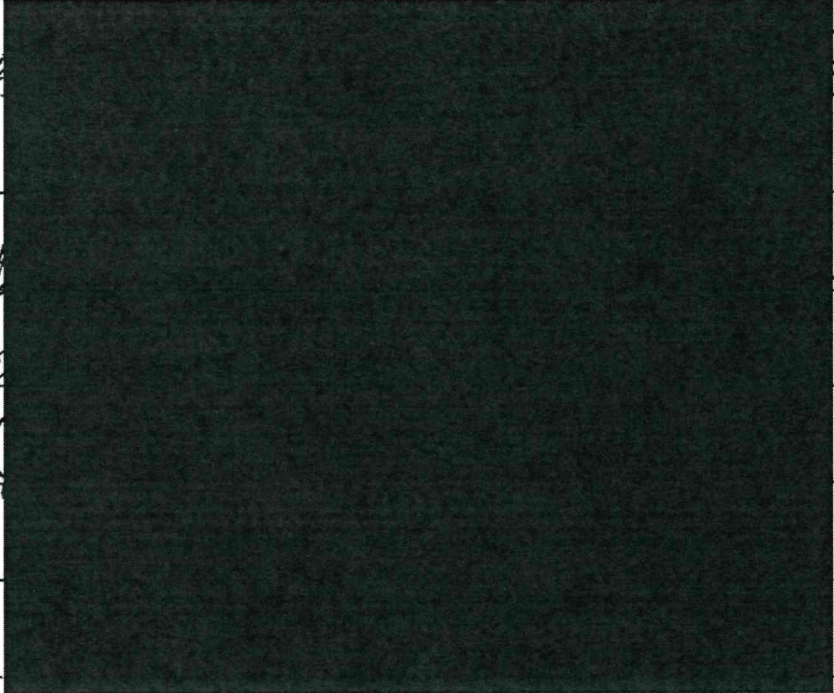
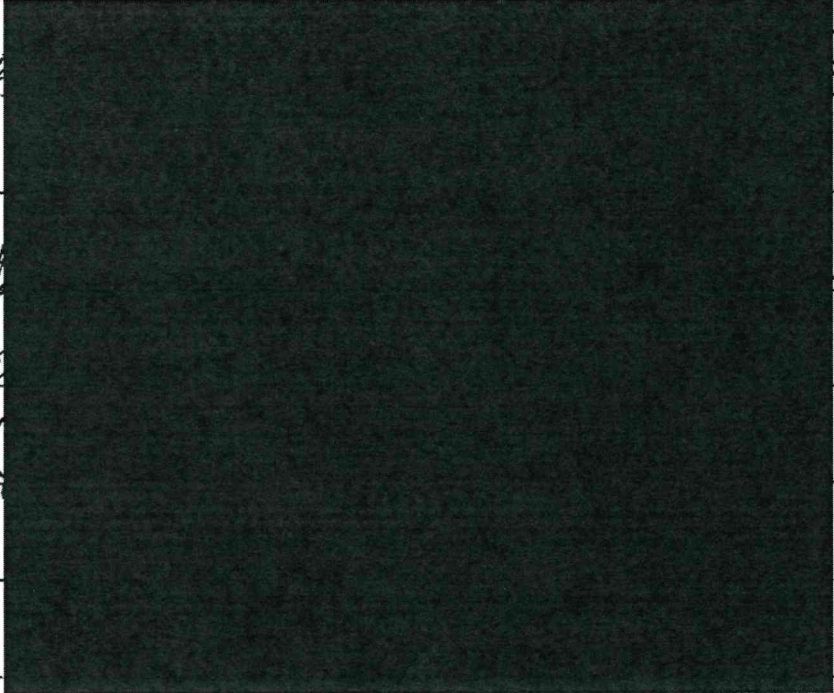
We respectfully request that City Council address and correct the ongoing problem with the late start of general meetings. In 2025, meetings started an average of 29 minutes late. This is substantially later than other cities in Los Angeles County, including those that have a closed session prior to the open session. The first two meetings in 2026 starting an average of 66 minutes late. This serves as a deterrent or disincentive for people to attend, especially for residents who have young children or who just generally do not have time to sit and wait for meetings that seldom start on time. Habitually starting late is also disrespectful towards constituents and sends the message that their time does not matter. Pasadena residents deserve better, and we ask that you address this ongoing problem.

Dear Hon Mayor Gordo and Council Members:

I am writing to share an observation from the July 13 City Council meeting.

As you know, the public session of the Council on July 13 started quite late, just shy of an hour late. Not for the first time; many times. But this time the chamber was full of AFSME member city workers, as well as a group of students there for the "Park Month" presentation. These were all folks who made a special effort to attend. While I know that it was not the Mayor's or the Council's intent, the fact is that the very late start on July 13 ended up being disrespectful to the workers and the students.

The AFSME members were working folks, mostly younger, probably many with young families, and they all filed into the room early, well before 6pm. The students, well, were students, and -- you may or may not be aware of this -- after 45 minutes, their teacher and they all filed out. Gave up, went home, were not there when the Council open session started, so missed the presentation.

When, just before 7pm, the open session did start, the Mayor, either on his own or on the advice of the clerk, limits general public comments to a minute each. So the AFSME folks - and others (trees, etc) - having waited over an hour, are all penalized for a failure to manage the closed session in a timely way? I felt bad, embarrassed for the city.

However the clock for the closed sessions is being managed, it is not working. Either the Council needs to begin the closed session earlier, or there is a need to manage the clock and the agenda better.

Second comment, this time about public comment for substantive agenda items. I appreciate that some Council Members often hold questions or motions until after hearing public comment. Thank you. In general, I'd say it might be worth considering adopting this as a best practice: hear public comment either at the start of an agenda item, or after the City's presentation, and before council members' discussion. Let public comment inform your debate, rather than serve as a postscript.

12. Pasadena Meeting dates and times

The City Council has been failing to conduct its duties with repeated and habitual cancellation of public meetings and grossly late starts. This conduct is disrupting the city's ability to act on a wide range of matters and is disruptive and unprofessional not only to each other as colleagues, but to city staff and the general public.

Pasadena City Council meeting for the last 20 months have started an average of 30 minutes late. Council Committee meetings are also cancelled or start late far too often.

Take the very first time I came to speak at City Hall in 2023 for a Public Safety Committee Meeting when the purchase of a Cell Site Simulator was on the agenda. However, the meeting was cancelled 30 minutes after the start time due to lack of quorum. Many city staff and department heads had prepared materials and presentations, made themselves available only to wait and not get to conduct the business of the people. I made time to be at City Hall for a 4 pm meeting, also research and prepare a comment, only to be deprived of my opportunity to engage in matters affecting me and my neighbors. The Public Safety Committee cancelled 8 of its 14 meetings last year and has already cancelled 3 out of its 9 meetings this year – including two meetings when Flock was on the agenda and large numbers of people planned to attend. (Another meeting with Flock on the agenda was adjourned early due to a loss of quorum.)

The most recent Municipal Services Committee meeting was canceled just minutes before it was supposed to start. The July meeting of the Housing, Homelessness and Planning Committee meeting was canceled just hours before it was supposed to start. This is not the only time, there have been other meetings where I and others have had to leave before even public comment for items not on the agenda (which is supposed to be at the start of meetings).

Our elected council members must actually show up to do the work they have been elected to do. We implore you to figure out a way to start City Council meetings on time and to stop cancelling Council Committee meetings.

Council Committee meetings are also cancelled far too often. The most recent Municipal Services Committee meeting was canceled just minutes before it was supposed to start. The Public Safety Committee cancelled 8 of its 14 meetings last year and has already cancelled 3 out of its 9 meetings this year – including two meetings when Flock was on the agenda and large numbers of people planned to attend. (Another meeting with Flock on the agenda was adjourned early due to a loss of quorum.) The July meeting of the Housing, Homelessness and Planning Committee meeting was canceled just hours before it was supposed to start. This is a pattern that has pervaded for far too long.

This is abysmal. Our elected council members must actually show up to do the work they have been elected to do. And community members should not be left waiting way past the start time for meetings to begin.

We implore you to figure out a way to start City Council meetings on time and to stop cancelling Council Committee meetings.
