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Dear Mayor and Councilmembers,

Attached please find my letter regarding the independent traffic engineering rebuttal for the proposed project at 1364 E. Green Street from Prism Engineering. Please make the report public record for the hearing on February 23rd.

In addition, I respectfully ask that you take a few minutes to view the following drone footage, which captures existing traffic conditions on Holliston Avenue during school activity:

What you will see in the video:

- **In the opening portion of the footage:** vehicle queues already extending well beyond intersection approaches during school drop-off.
- **Midway through the video:** cars stacked bumper-to-bumper along Holliston, with pedestrians — including young children — navigating between stopped vehicles.
- **As the camera widens:** the narrow width of the residential street and the proximity of the school, church, and neighborhood homes to heavy vehicle movement.
- **Throughout the footage:** spillback conditions where congestion extends through intersections and blocks driveways.

These are existing conditions — before the addition of a 93,000+ square foot R&D facility generating over 1,000 daily trips, supported by a 260-car garage and daily commercial deliveries.

The findings in the attached letter, combined with this visual evidence, raise serious safety concerns for the 550 students at St. Philip the Apostle School, as well as pedestrians and parishioners who rely on Holliston Avenue every day.

At a minimum, the issues identified warrant a more thorough operational analysis during actual school peak hours and meaningful consideration of redirecting project access to Green Street.

I never imagined the City would so clearly blur the longstanding boundary between a quiet residential neighborhood and high-intensity commercial development without fully resolving the safety implications first.

Thank you for your time, your careful review, and your continued commitment to public safety.

Dear Mayor and Members of the City Council,

I am writing to urge you to carefully review and support the findings contained in the independent traffic engineering rebuttal regarding the proposed project at 1364 E. Green Street, known as the Caltech Research & Development project. The report raises significant safety concerns related to increased traffic around the approximately 550 children who attend St. Philip the Apostle School each day, as well as the pedestrians and parishioners who call this neighborhood home.

Most importantly, the rebuttal identifies a fundamental flaw: the City's traffic study did not evaluate conditions during the actual peak conflict times — morning drop-off (7:30–8:30 a.m.) and afternoon pick-up (2:45–3:45 p.m.). These are precisely the periods when vehicle queues form, pedestrians are concentrated, and street capacity is fully utilized. It is clearly when the risk of accidents is highest.

Holliston Avenue is not a high-capacity corridor. It is a narrow residential street that already experiences standing vehicle queues twice daily due to school operations. During these windows, traffic does not flow — it stops. Vehicles back up through intersections and block driveways. Adding approximately 1,036 daily project trips, including 90–100 vehicles per hour, into this constrained environment without a true operational analysis is deeply concerning. The inclusion of a 260-space underground parking structure and a multi-truck loading dock reflects the scale and intensity of use being introduced.

The rebuttal report also highlights:

- A documented 620-foot vehicle backup at the southbound left-turn lane at Hill and Del Mar — meaning cars routinely stack up for more than two football fields. While the overall intersection was given a passing grade, this specific movement is already overwhelmed and regularly spills back into the roadway.
- The absence of a proper traffic operations or microsimulation analysis for closely spaced intersections, where congestion and spillback are known to occur.
- Using “General Office” modeling assumptions rather than a Research & Development land use category may underestimate trip characteristics and patterns.
- A generalized growth-rate methodology that does not reflect real-world traffic impacts from recently approved developments.

It is highly unusual that private residents and parishioners would feel compelled to retain their own licensed traffic engineer simply to understand what they experience daily on their own street. This step was not taken lightly. It was taken because what parents and neighbors see every day — long queues, blocked driveways, unsafe passing, and intersection spillback — did not appear to be reflected in the City's conclusions.

I have also been informed that none of the substantive issues raised in the independent rebuttal were directly addressed in the City's response. That lack of engagement is concerning, particularly given that the City recently adopted updated traffic analysis standards intended to strengthen transparency and analytical rigor. Those policies should be applied consistently and meaningfully here.

Importantly, the rebuttal proposes a reasonable and feasible alternative: redirecting primary project access to Green Street, a higher-capacity roadway, rather than concentrating all access onto Holliston Avenue. This adjustment would materially reduce conflict with school traffic and pedestrian activity. Quite frankly, Holliston Avenue cannot safely absorb what is being proposed.

This is not opposition to innovation, land rights, or responsible development. It is about ensuring that development is analyzed honestly, mitigated appropriately, and designed to protect children, pedestrians, and neighborhood streets.

Before approving this project, I respectfully ask that the City:

1. Require a full traffic operations analysis, including microsimulation of the Hill/Del Mar/Cordova corridor.
2. Analyze traffic during actual school peak hours.
3. Reevaluate trip generation assumptions specific to R&D land use.
4. Redesign access to Green Street to avoid concentrating traffic on Holliston.
5. Fully acknowledge and address the existing two-football-field vehicle backup at Hill and Del Mar before adding more traffic to an already strained corridor.

Good planning requires looking beyond average numbers and examining what is truly happening on the ground. Pasadena's 140-year legacy of thoughtful planning is what makes this city exceptional. That legacy should not be compromised by overlooking legitimate safety concerns.

The safety of children, parishioners, and neighbors must remain paramount. Once safety is diminished, it is extraordinarily difficult to restore.

I respectfully ask you to slow down, require a more complete analysis, and ensure that this project fits the neighborhood it is entering.

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Dear Mayor and City Council,

I oppose the proposed project at 1364 East Green Street and respectfully urge the City Council to deny it as designed.

I write not only as a Pasadena resident, but as someone who has been a parishioner at St. Philip the Apostle for 27 years and currently serves on the St. Philip's School Board. My family's roots — and my heart — are deeply planted in this neighborhood.

Pasadena is more than buildings and zoning maps. It is tree-lined streets, historic homes, neighborhood churches, and schools where generations of children grow and learn. St. Philip's Church itself is part of that legacy — designed by renowned architect **Roland Coate**, whose work helped shape the architectural character of our city. It stands not only as a place of worship, but as a historic and cultural landmark within our community.

I regularly attend either the morning Mass or the lunchtime Mass. These quiet moments of prayer are part of the rhythm of daily life for many of us. It is difficult to imagine how regular worship could continue uninterrupted during years of heavy construction immediately adjacent to the church and school. The noise, vibration, traffic, and disruption would directly affect the spiritual life of our parish and the daily experience of our students.

Pasadena has long prided itself on protecting residential neighborhoods from incompatible commercial encroachment. That commitment has preserved the livability, human scale, and character that define our city. For that reason, I struggle with the fact that a project of this scale was advanced immediately beside homes, a church, and a school. It feels inconsistent with the very principles that have guided Pasadena's planning for generations and your own commitment as elected officials.

Growth is not the enemy. But it must be thoughtful, measured, and respectful of context. Developments that prioritize maximum height and density over neighborhood compatibility change not just skylines, but the feel of our streets and the trust residents place in the planning process.

I respectfully ask you to protect our neighborhoods, honor our architectural heritage, and ensure that Pasadena's future reflects the stewardship that has long made this city special.

Apparently not one person on the City of Pasadena Design Commission, the Pasadena City Council, the Caltech Planning Committee for the Green Street Project, or Ms. Nancy Moses and the Trammell Crow Company is going to sit, sleep and work within 20 yards of the behemoth that you are planning to squeeze into the very small parking lot across from 107 South Holliston. But I will. I will face it. Daily. For years. I am 84 years old, a work-at-home teacher and resident on this residential street for 26 years.

Empty lots north of Green Street all the way to Colorado sit vacant. Why can this amazing "hub for scientific invention" not be built where it will harm no one? This project should never have been approved for this lot. As well, an empty lot at Hill and Colorado needs a building as well. Whatever gave Caltech planners the idea that building next to St. Phillips Church and school and across from a nursery school in a residential neighborhood was the perfect place for a massive business building?

Clearly, not one of you will hear the noise or struggle through traffic jams on your street, blocked with trucks, cranes, and construction equipment. Not one of you will be awakened at 7 a.m. by pounding jackhammers and throbbing cement mixers and men yelling as if they are standing in your bedroom.

Not one of you will suffer physical and psychological harm due to your neighborhood being ripped to pieces in front of you over many months and then years. And the children trying to read at St. Philips the Apostle School, directly adjacent to the deafening construction site? Why is their safety not being considered in this neighborhood disaster- story? And, the pre-schoolers at the PCC nursery school at the corner that faces this lot? They walk daily up and down Holliston Avenue and play in their schoolyard. Parents drop them off, pick them up — all on Holliston Avenue. St. Phillips parents line up twice daily on Holliston to drop off and pick up students and their SUV's jam up Holliston.

Stop this project now. Its placement is inhumane and will hurt the St. Phillips' students and teachers, as well as residents on Holliston Avenue This is a residential environment and it always has been. It must not be destroyed by people who do not live here, do not have students here, and do not worship here. No design

changes will change the basic problem here: this little parking lot should never have been considered, much less approved by you for this behemoth.

My name is Millie Bruce. I am writing on behalf of myself and my husband Thomas Bruce. We are the proud parents of a current Kindergarten student at St. Philip the Apostle School and parishioner of St. Philip the Apostle Church. I am writing to you today to express my concerns regarding the proposed building at 1364 E. Green Street.

Below is a list of our concerns regarding the new construction of the 1364 E. Green Street building:

1.) Safety during construction.

a.) We are very concerned about unvetted personnel coming and going in such close proximity to St. Philip the Apostle School and our child.

b.) We are concerned that the drilling, vibrations, and operation of heavy machinery and equipment will be unsafe for our child.

c.) We have extensive concerns for the constructions effect on the air quality during the drilling of the subterranean parking lot. Especially given the recent fires and the potential for soil contamination and dust particles.

2.) Historical and Cultural Preservation of Pasadena.

a.) My husband is native of the area, growing up in San Marino, and we are so proud to raise our son in the Pasadena community. One of the draws to the Pasadena community is that is grounded in tradition. We are concerned that the proposed building, will not only tower over the highest point of the church and our children's playground, but also that the design will compromise that ascetic of the church, school and neighborhood.

3.) Improper Zoning.

a.) We were very disappointed to learn that the area has recently been rezoned. Especially, after little or no efforts to alert St. Philip School about the rezoning. We learned that within the city documents there is no mention of the school as an impacted neighbor – only the church. St.

Philip School teaches 550 students, with kids as young as 4-years-old being taught yards from this proposed new project, which the rezoning paved the way for.

In closing, we expect our city officials to value the safety of our most vulnerable community members - which includes our son. We understand that Cal Tech is a intrinsic part of our community and believe that innovation only improves our community, but disagree that this project considers the full impact to our community - specifically the children attending St. Philip the Apostle School. We strongly object to the building of 1364 E. Green Street.

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Dear Mayor and City Council,

On behalf of St. Philip the Apostle Church and School, we are submitting the attached architectural drawings and contemporaneous newspaper clippings documenting the work of **Roland Coate**, the original architect of **St. Philip the Apostle Catholic Church**, for inclusion in the administrative record for the proposed development at Green Street and Holliston Avenue.

These materials provide clear evidence of the architectural authorship and historic significance of the church campus. The Environmental Review failed to recognize that Roland Coate was the original architect of the church and did not analyze the implications of his authorship in determining whether the campus qualifies as a historical resource under CEQA Guidelines §15064.5. Architectural drawings and contemporaneous newspaper documentation confirming Coate's authorship are now being formally submitted for the record. Because the significance of a property's architect is a central factor in historical resource evaluation, this omission renders the historical resources analysis incomplete.

Given Mr. Coate's recognized architectural legacy in Pasadena and Southern California, the failure to evaluate his authorship directly affects the adequacy of the City's CEQA review and may have resulted in an incomplete assessment of impacts to a historical resource and its setting.

Accordingly, we formally request that:

1. The attached materials be incorporated into the official project file and administrative record;
2. The City conduct a supplemental historical resource evaluation that includes analysis of Roland Coate's authorship and the church campus under CEQA Guidelines §§15064.5 and 15126.4; and
3. If warranted by that analysis, the environmental document be revised and recirculated to ensure full compliance with CEQA prior to any further discretionary approvals.

We respectfully request written confirmation that these materials have been received and that the City will address this issue in its environmental review.

File Plans for \$200,000 Catholic Church With City

Plans for the new \$200,000 St. Phillip's Catholic church at 125 South Hill avenue have been submitted to the city department of building, with the application for building permit filed yesterday.

The new structure to be erected on the parking lot for the existing church will be constructed of reinforced concrete, with tile roof. Its architecture will be modernized Italian Romanesque, the plans hav-

ing been prepared by Roland E. Coate, Pasadena architect.

Seating capacity of the new St. Phillip's will be 800, with 18,000 square feet being the overall size of the building.

Construction will probably not be started for several months, according to Coate.

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Mayfield Auxiliary Schedules Art Tour

Architects of the "Pasadena school" who have brought renown to California architecture the world around will be honored by the showing of elegant homes designed by them here when Mayfield School Auxiliary gives its first Art and Architecture Tour Nov. 15.

Five homes, in addition to the former Eagle and Warner estates which now house Mayfield High School on Bellefontaine and South Orange Grove, will be viewed on the invitational 12-to-5 p.m. tour. Also included will be a showing of work by leading contemporary California artists at the Manhattan Gallery on South Lake.

Proceeds of the affair will benefit the Mayfield School building fund.

Mrs. P. James Kirby, auxiliary president, has named Mrs. J. Edward Martin, general chairman. Working with her are Mmes. David Hoyt, arrangements; William Clary and Jerome Murphy, invitations; Miller Sullivan and Francis R. Kistl, publicity; Frederick J. Wood, Eugene E. Ronay, and William W. Francis, refreshments; Donley Brady and Carl Holmes, reservations; Mmes. Martin and John Lucas, program; James A. Carmack, properties; Robert D. Sumpf, James Marshall, Francis J. Kane, and John C. Blumier, Manhattan Gallery art.

Docents at the houses are Mmes. Theodore Batry, William R. Hees III, William R. Howell, Douglas M. Longyear, Morse Payne, Louis R. Rowan, Robert A. Rowan, and Paul A. Erskine.

The Gamble house on Westmoreland Place, built in 1908 and designed by Greene and Greene, who also designed the interior furnishings, will be shown. The Regency house built for the Sidney Francis family on South Grand, now owned by the Kenneth Moores, was designed by Reginald Johnson for the site of the old Bishop Johnson estate.

Myron Hunt designed the Tudor-style mansion of Sir William and Lady Crocker on

Oak Grove, known as the Emery house. The French Provincial style home adapted to California garden living by Roland Coate for the William Claytons of Lombardy Road, and the Mediterranean villa in a town house setting designed by Wallace Neff and belonging to his sister, Miss Della Neff, on South Orange Grove are also on the tour.

The Eagle estate is a luxuriously appointed Italian style mansion built for the late John Eagle, silk magnate, and Sunnycrest which belonged to the late Thomas W. Warners is a Mediterranean villa on South Orange Grove, newest addition to the Mayfield complex.

Other structures of importance designed by these architects include Myron Hunt's buildings for Pasadena Public Library—considered the most outstanding public building in the area for its proportions and classical lines—, Huntington Library, the earlier buildings on campuses of Occidental, Pomona, and Caltech, Huntington Memorial Hospital, White Memorial, and the Rose Bowl.

Wallace Neff designed Pickfair and residences of other motion picture folk including Cary Grant and Barbara Hutton and Joan Bennett, also the Doheny Chapel, Manresa Retreat House in Azusa, and St. Elizabeth's Catholic Church. Roland Coate's designs include All Saints Episcopal Church and St. Philip's; Reginald Johnson's, the Santa Barbara Biltmore, many noted Santa Barbara homes, St. Paul's pro Cathedral (with Roland Coate), and the Baldwin Hills low-cost housing development. Famous Greene and Greene homes herabouts are the James A. Culbertson home, the L. A. Robinson, the Blacker and Crowe houses.



St. Philip's Catholic Church, 151 South Hill Ave., ministering to a thousand Pasadena families, has beautiful church and school and new parish house.

THE PARISH of St. Philip the Apostle was established in February, 1921, and the Rev. Daniel O'Connell was named as first pastor. Father O'Connell at the time was assistant to the Rev. Msgr. John McCarthy of St. Andrew's, Pasadena, and the mother church aided substantially in the beginning of the work.

A temporary church—now the parish hall—was erected on the corner of Hill and Cordova Streets, and was dedicated on Jan. 20, 1922 by the Most Rev. John J. Cantwell, Archbishop of Los Angeles. In 1927 property adjoining the church was purchased for the erection of a parish school, and Father O'Connell was able to secure as teachers members of the distinguished community of the Sisters of Charity whose motherhouse is in Dubuque, Iowa.

When Father O'Connell died in July, 1937, Msgr. Thomas O'Regan was appointed pastor. The city's growth necessitated new facilities for divine worship and a parish committee, consisting of E. T. Foley, Dr. Charles Strub, W. J. Donahue, John A. McCone, Stuart O'Melvey, Thomas Pike and James Kelley was formed for the project. Roland Coate, distinguished Pasadena architect, was selected to prepare the plans. The present structure on the west side of the Pasadena City College campus has won praise for the beauty of its simplicity and the harmony of its proportions. Monsignor O'Regan completed the erection of a convent on Holliston Avenue in 1955.

Monsignor William E. North, third pastor of St. Philip's, succeeded the late Monsignor Thomas O'Regan Nov. 3, 1957. Born in Chicago in 1904, he came to Pasadena after a 10-year pastorate at the Church of St. Mark in Venice. In addition to his parish duties there he served for eight years as editor of The Tidings, official newspaper of the archdiocese of Los Angeles. In 1937-1938 he was superintendent of Catholic schools in the Southern California area. Ordained in 1931, he earned his doctorate in education at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C.




• SOUTH ELEVATION •


ELEVATION - NORTH TRANSEPT

I write in support of the proposed Caltech Innovation Center at 1364 East Green Street, in the context of Appeal # DHP2025-00258. This project represents an important step forward for the neighborhood and the City of Pasadena, and I urge the Council to approve it at the earliest possible time.

After thorough discussion and approval by the Design Commission, the plan for the Innovation Center is well-matched to the Green Street location. The site has for many years been an unattractive surface parking lot — contributing little to the neighborhood's vitality, walkability, or tax base. I respect those concerns, and I believe they are sincerely held. At the same time, I am confident that our partners at Trammell Crow have the experience and skill needed to address worries about construction noise, and I believe that replacement of a vacant lot with a well-managed innovation center will improve neighborhood safety. The required traffic studies have been completed. It is my sincere belief that the innovation center will be a net benefit to the church and school, with advantages that include expanded options for parking and enrichment activities for students if the school wishes to pursue them. We will strive to be good neighbors.

This project affords Pasadena an opportunity to build on the presence of Caltech in a way that benefits the East Colorado neighborhood, the City, and the broader economy of the San Gabriel Valley. I urge the Council to approve this project, and to send a clear

signal that Pasadena is open for the kind of thoughtful, high-quality development that is essential to its future.

St. Philip the Apostle School is a 500-student K-8 institution and immediate neighbor to the proposed site, yet it is never mentioned in the original project documentation. The school's playground and outdoor facilities along Holliston Avenue were mislabeled as "GREENSCAPE," falsely implying they are public park space. School buildings, including two Transitional Kindergarten classrooms, appear as blank structures in the project schematics. These are not minor omissions. My name is Benjamin Stoney and I am a proud father of 2 young girls who attend St. Philip the Apostle School. My daughters are 9 and 6 years old, in 3rd grade and kindergarten respectively, at the school. My family is a parishioner at St. Philip the Apostle Church. My wife, a lifelong resident of South Pasadena and Pasadena, and I have owned a home in Pasadena for more than 11 years and continue to intend on living in the area for a lifetime to come. The purpose of my communication is to express my concern and opposition to the proposed building project at 1364 East Green Street. This project is a money grab for the landowner and lessor, the California Institute of Technology – plan and simple. The lack of concern for our school, church and nearby community is not only disappointing, it runs counter to the foundation of providing for a safe and thriving environment in which our children need to exist. Additionally, the people in this very tall building will be able to see the children outside at all times. Who knows who these individuals will be. As a long time resident, I am deeply concerned about the proposed R&D project near Green Street, given its location next to a grade school, childcare center, an active church, and established homes. The current environmental review does not appear to fully address potential health, traffic, and quality-of-life impacts on these sensitive uses. Pasadena has long been known for careful zoning and planning standards that protect our most vulnerable. Recent broad amendments that allow R&D facilities citywide raise serious concerns when applied directly adjacent to schools and churches. Higher-intensity uses should be concentrated along established commercial corridors (such as Fair Oaks, Colorado, and Lake) — not steps away from young children. In addition, the traffic at Hill and Del Mar is already congested. A facility of this size would seignificantly make what is already a nuisance, much worse. I respectfully ask the City Council to require a full environmental review before this project proceeds.
