The latest AB 481 Military Equipment report states that the Pasadena Police Department intends to purchase more drones and significantly expand their use outside of SWAT. I oppose the expansion or purchase of surveillance equipment like drones and robots. There was no discussion by PPD, the Community Police Oversight Commission or the City Council about independent studies on the effectiveness of drones for public safety. Pasadena has a responsibility to clearly discuss with the public what this program will look like, the acceptable uses, the vendors under consideration, and the drone capabilities. Most importantly, the City should first determine if this is even what the community wants! It is unacceptable for community members to have to fight for our privacy when the monies have already been allocated and the RFPs have been issued. City leadership needs to first find out if the community even wants these instead of just nodding yes to everything that PPD asks for.

I oppose the purchase of a robot for PPD for the same reasons. Once again, the public has no idea from the AB481 Report, CPOC materials, or any other public information what is being considered. PPD is always talking about transparency and accountability but all we get is more secrecy.

Committee,

I am very concerned about the two draft policies for PPD: so-called "Energy Assisted Breaching" and expanded UAS/drone policies.

Regarding "Energy Assisted Breaching," has PPD presented any justification for the need to maintain an inventory of explosives and trained blasting personnel? Has our SWAT team been defeated or otherwise diminished because the department does not currently have the ability to use explosives to blow holes in walls? Has the "lock defeating rounds and breaching shotgun" that the department already possesses proven ineffective? (Notably, it was reported to not have been used in the 2025-2026 Annual Military Equipment Report.)

The euphemistic "Energy Assisted Breaching" is a term that conceals the department's intent to handle a new class of dangerous explosives. I do not feel safer with a police department authorized to use more explosives than they already possess authorization to use.

Committee, please use your seats of power to at least demand justification for this inherently-dangerous and expensive authorization.

Regarding the expanded UAS/drone policies, there are several unanswered questions about the new policy.

First, is the existing policy 408.4.4 that is written to scope the UAS authorization to SWAT alone being deprecated or changed as a result of the new draft policy 622?

Second, is the intent of the new draft policy 622 intended to broaden the authorized operators within PPD beyond just SWAT? If so, this is a big expansion of authorization and enables lesser-trained members of the agency to use and access these systems.

Third, as a resident in the city, I do support the use of Drones as First Responders. The ability for their misuse and abuse is exceedingly high, and they will add to the nuisance of yet more PPD vehicles hovering over our neighborhoods.

Fourth, the list of permitted missions for UAS deployments include "Project planning and threat assessment imaging of infrastructure and facilities" and "Mapping critical infrastructure" which are concerns outside of the police department and likely better served by the Department of Public Works, or another adjacent city department.

Fifth, the paragraph describing how the department may deploy UAS for some events, parades, etc., but limits itself when deploying over "First Amendment-protected activity" is a weird way to suggest that the First Amendment somehow doesn't apply equally to events. If this policy is to stand at all, the stricter policy regarding First Amendment-protected activity should be the standard for deployment, regardless of the type of event.

I firmly oppose draft policy 622 and its significant expansion of PPD's use of drones.

Background & Objectives

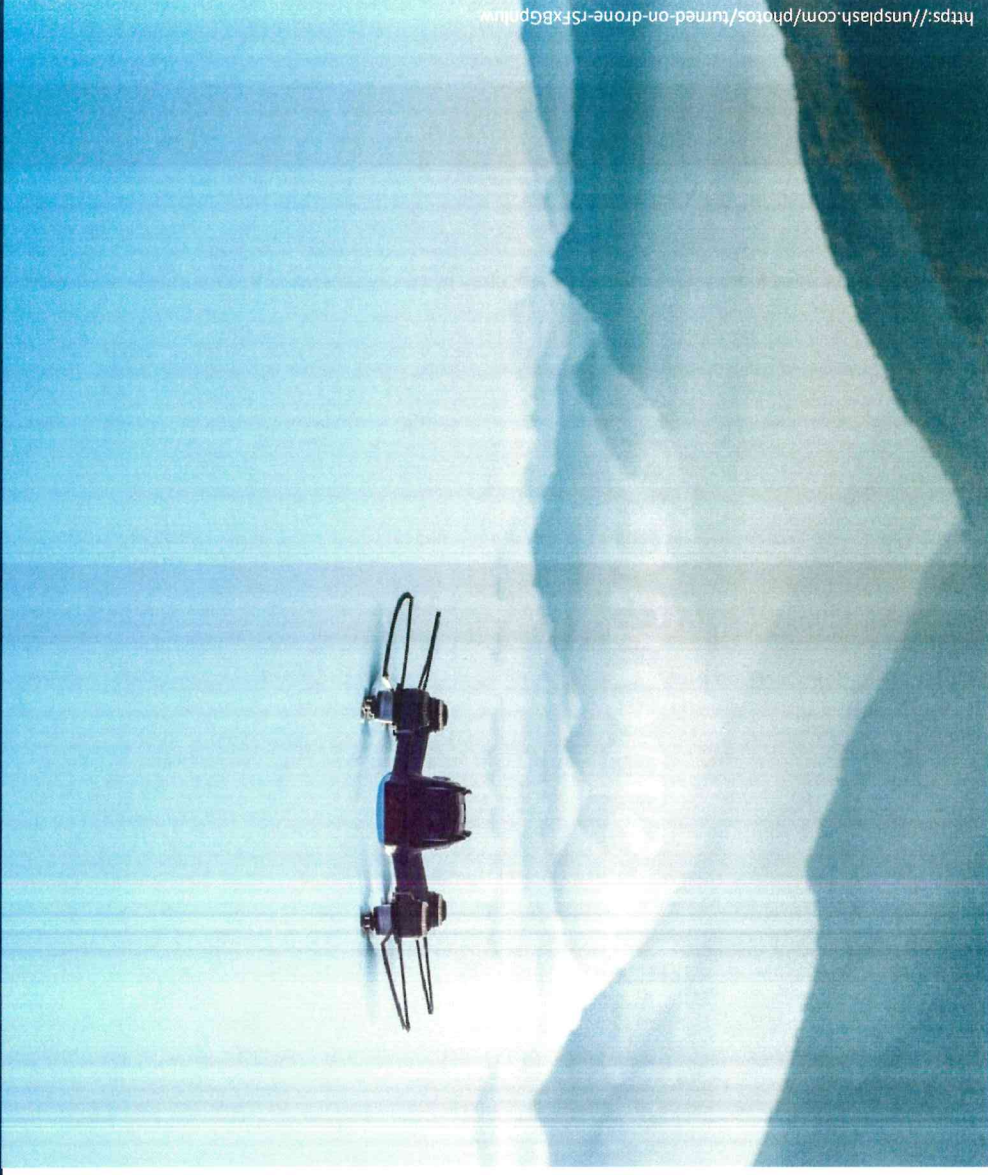
Background

The Berkeley Police Department has proposed acquiring a Drone as First Responder (DFR) program. In response to this proposal, the Police Accountability Board (PAB) requested that the UC Berkeley Criminal Law & Justice Center conduct an independent policy review.

Objectives

This presentation seeks to evaluate the Berkeley Police Department's proposed Drones as First Responder use policies under Policy 611 and assesses the preliminary analytical framework developed by the Office of the Director of Police Accountability and shared with CLJC in an October 2025 memorandum:

- Empirical Verification
- Policy and Civil-Liberties Analysis
- Transparency and Oversight Framework
- Cost and Operational Modeling
- Equity and Community Impact
- Comparative Benchmarking



Methodology

Empirical Effectiveness Analysis

Empirical Effectiveness Analysis was conducted to examine claims advanced by technology vendors and police departments, including performance assertions and data privacy guarantees, by drawing on publicly available crime statistics, drone deployment data, comparative jurisdictional analysis, and peer-reviewed literature

Policy Analysis

Policy Analysis was undertaken to evaluate BPD's proposed use policies, oversight structures, and documented cost frameworks through a comparative review of peer jurisdictions. The goal was to identify essential safeguards and enforceable provisions that must be in place should the City choose to move forward with approving a Drone as First Responder program.

Legal and Constitutional Review

Legal and Constitutional review focused on Fourth Amendment search limitations, First Amendment protected-activities, California privacy law (Art. I, § 1), AB 481 requirements, and CalECPA electronic surveillance provisions were undertaken to evaluate legal risk, case law, statutory interpretation, and municipal policy precedent. See Appendix A for detailed legal framework.

Limitations: The information in this presentation draws on publicly available data from peer jurisdictions, peer-reviewed scholarship and secondary analyses of department flight logs, and findings should be interpreted accordingly. Clearance rate comparisons are descriptive rather than causal. The observed divergence between high- and low-drone deployment categories may reflect differences in crime type, reporting patterns, prosecutorial standards, or concurrent policy interventions, and cannot be attributed to drone deployment alone without controlled study design and case-level outcome data.

CLJC Recommends Against DFR Procurement

X

NO EMPIRICAL BASIS

Claims of staffing efficiencies, de-escalation and safety are not supported by peer-jurisdiction evidence and peer-reviewed literature.

SFPD data shows that crime categories with high drone deployment underperformed by 85.7pp compared to the control group.

CONSTITUTIONAL RISK

Potential for significant 1st and 4th Amendment exposure. Mission creep documented in many peer jurisdictions.

Policy language alone insufficient—restrictions must be built into procurement.

CRITICAL POLICY GAPS

In December, 2025, the FCC added all foreign-produced drones to its Covered List under the FY2025 NDAA, creating supply chain and lifecycle uncertainty for BPD's proposed DJI fleet.

BPD's Impact Statement contains no reference to the FCC ruling, omits Flock sanctuary law exposure, and fails to project LTE infrastructure, data storage, fleet replacement, or the operational risks the Covered List ruling creates for long-term hardware commitments. Fiscal disclosure is materially incomplete.

SECTION 3 — EMPIRICAL EVIDENCE

BPD Claims: Limits of the Available Evidence Thus Far

KEY FINDING: High-drone crime categories showed mean acceleration of -85.7pp vs. +29.7pp for low-drone categories — a 115.4pp gap. This is descriptive, not causal, but warrants further investigation before deployment.

NDAA Compliance Changes: Three of BPD's four proposed drone models (DJI Avata 2, Matrice 4T, Matrice 4TD) were added to the FCC Covered List in December 2025. BPD's Impact Statement fails to reference this ruling. Within the disclosed 3-year hardware lifespan, these units may face operational and fiscal restrictions requiring premature NDAA-compliant replacement at significantly higher cost.

Sanctuary Law Risk: ACLU investigations document Flock's default agreements may permit data sharing even when agencies opt out. Oakland PD — prohibited by CA law from sharing with federal agencies — allowed federal-marked data access through Flock in 2025. BPD's proposal does not address vendor data access, third-party access, footage storage location, or warrant-compelled disclosure protocols.

Comparable Program: Chula Vista's salary-absorption model failed — City Council approved \$1.5M annual investment. BPD's proposed model mirrors the same structure which may prove to be unsustainable in the long-term.

Why These Risks Are Not Hypothetical

1ST 1st AMENDMENT

2017: Alameda & Contra Costa Sheriff's flew drones over peaceful protests in Berkeley and Richmond

Departments have classified protest surveillance as 'public safety' to circumvent warrant requirements and public record requests

Berkeley must categorically prohibit deployment at assemblies, not merely restrict it

4TH 4th AMENDMENT

Kyllo v. United States: advanced sensors (thermal) into homes = search requiring warrant

Carpenter v. United States: sustained tracking of movements = unconstitutional without warrant

Policy 611's vague authorization language may create litigation risk

EQ RACIAL EQUITY

SFPD: Drone flights concentrated in Tenderloin, Mission, SoMa, Bayview — highest minority & low-income areas

Strong spatial overlap between racialized neighborhoods and drone deployments

Berkeley lacks any equity monitoring or per-tract deployment cap in proposed policy

Addressing the PAB's Five Key Focus Areas

CLJC's Staged Recommendation for Council Consideration

PRIMARY: Recommend the City Council REJECT BPD's DFR proposal in its current form. The primary public safety justification is not supported by evidence. Constitutional and fiscal risks are unmitigated. Current and projected fiscal models remain incomplete.

CATEGORICAL PROHIBITION (regardless of any other decision): Categorically prohibit interior drone procurement (drones capable of entering enclosed structures) under any circumstances.

IF COUNCIL DECLINES TO REJECT — Condition Authorization on 3 Mandatory Pre-Deployment Stages:

STAGE 1 Mandatory Risk Assessment	STAGE 2 Bounded 12-Month Pilot	STAGE 3 Pre-Defined Success Metrics

Binding success metrics adopted by ordinance BEFORE any pilot authorization, with data architecture requirements built into procurement specs

05

Per-census-tract deployment caps and mandatory demographic flight logging to enable disparate impact monitoring under Berkeley's anti-discrimination policies

M T Sabha,

Community members have been raising concerns about surveillance technology for years, and we have been coming to city meetings in increasing numbers to talk to you about how dangerous this is. Other cities are cancelling contracts and recognizing the frequent abuses of this technology that inevitably occur, but Pasadena is doubling down. Why?

In addition to adding more and more surveillance cameras to our city, Pasadena PD wants to purchase more drones and significantly expand their use outside of SWAT. Our City Council, as well as the Public Safety Committee and the Community Police Oversight Commission, has a responsibility to discuss what that would mean for the people who live, work, and spend time in Pasadena. What vendors are up for these contracts, what use of drones is acceptable, what safeguards will be in place? The public should be allowed and encouraged to weigh in. The potential purchase and use of robots should be discussed as well.

2. AB 481 D - Drone (UAS) Policy

2. AB 481 D - Drone (UAS) Policy

Unmanned Aerial System (UAS)

622.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to establish guidelines for the use of unmanned aerial systems (UAS) and for the storage, retrieval and dissemination of images and data captured by the UAS.

The department realizes the use of unmanned aerial systems requires careful oversight to protect privacy, civil liberties, and public trust while supporting legitimate public safety operations.

622.1.1 DEFINITIONS

Definitions related to this policy include:

~~**Drone as First Responder (DFR)** – The use of an Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS) deployed in response to calls for service or incidents to provide real-time situational awareness prior to or in support of arriving personnel.~~

~~**Remote Pilot in Command (RPIC)** – The person designated by the department who is responsible for the operation and safety of UAS in accordance with applicable FAA.~~

Unmanned aerial system (UAS) - An unmanned aircraft of any type that is capable of sustaining directed flight, whether preprogrammed or remotely controlled (commonly referred to as a drone or an unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV)), and all of the supporting or attached systems designed for gathering information through imaging, recording or any other means.

Visual Observer (VO) – A person assigned to assist the Remote Pilot in Command by maintaining visual line of sight of the UAS, monitoring the surrounding airspace, and communicating hazards or other relevant information to ensure safe operation.

622.2 POLICY

Unmanned aerial systems may be utilized to enhance the department's mission of protecting lives and property when other means and resources are not available or are less effective. Any use of a UAS will be in strict accordance with constitutional and privacy rights and Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations.

622.3 PRIVACY

The use of the UAS potentially involves privacy considerations. Absent a warrant or exigent circumstances, operators and observers shall not intentionally record or transmit images of any location where a person would have a reasonable expectation of privacy (e.g., residence, yard, enclosure). Operators and observers shall take reasonable precautions to avoid inadvertently recording or transmitting images of areas where there is a reasonable expectation of privacy to include deployments over sensitive locations, including schools and hospitals. When feasible and consistent with the mission, operators shall use flight positioning, camera orientation, or other reasonable measures to minimize the incidental capture of individuals, bystanders, and private areas unrelated to the authorized purpose of the deployment.

622.4 USE OF UAS

~~Each UAS deployment shall be tied to a call for service, investigation, planned public safety operation, emergency response, or other specific and articulable public safety purpose. UAS shall not be used for generalized surveillance, random patrol, or roving monitoring.~~

Only authorized operators who have completed the required training as described in section 622.7 shall be permitted to operate the UAS. Deployment of the UAS is authorized by the Chief of Police or their designee, for the following missions:

- ~~• Drones as a First Responder (DFR) to optimize response to calls for Service that include but are not limited to:~~
 - ~~• In Progress crimes~~
 - ~~• Calls for service where a response by ground units may be delayed~~
 - ~~• Calls for service where real time aerial intelligence can provide responding officers with immediate, situational awareness to enhance their response or prevent unnecessary, high risk contact (de-escalation)~~
- ~~• Tactical operations including SWAT operations~~
- ~~• Crime scene documentation and Traffic collision documentation~~
- ~~• Searches for missing or endangered people~~
- ~~• Searches for suspects believed to be in a defined perimeter~~
- ~~• Exigent circumstances in the immediate defense of life or great bodily harm~~
- ~~• Pursuant to a search warrant, arrest warrant or court order~~
- ~~• Critical incident management, disaster response and damage assessment~~
- ~~• Counter Terrorism operations~~
- ~~• Project planning and threat assessment imaging of infrastructure and facilities~~
- ~~• Mapping critical infrastructure~~

- ~~• UAS may be deployed during permitted events, parades, festivals, sporting events, and other large public gatherings where the Department has a defined public safety, traffic management, emergency response, or security role. These events are distinct from protests, demonstrations, and other First Amendment-protected activities, which are governed separately under this policy. Deployments under this section shall be limited to situational awareness, monitoring crowd size and movement, managing traffic and pedestrian flow, identifying safety hazards, coordinating emergency response, or responding to specific criminal activity or public safety incidents.~~
- ~~• UAS may be deployed at events involving First Amendment-protected activity only when a specific, articulable public safety concern, criminal complaint, or exigent circumstance exists and only upon prior supervisory authorization when practicable.~~

~~The Chief of Police or authorized designee may approve the use of UAS outside of these guidelines in the interests of public safety where there is a specific and articulable threat to the safety of the public or police.~~

~~Use of vision enhancement technology, including thermal imaging or other imaging equipment not generally available to the public, may be used to assist in locating a suspect believed to be within a defined search area when officers are lawfully present and the viewing is limited to areas where no reasonable expectation of privacy exists or when in compliance with a search warrant or court order. Any use based on exigent circumstances shall be limited to the scope and duration of the exigency and should be documented when practical. In all other instances, legal counsel should be consulted.~~

~~Nothing in this policy is intended to prohibit the deployment of a UAS when necessary to protect life or prevent serious bodily injury, provided such deployment is consistent with applicable law and FAA regulations.~~

~~UAS operations shall remain under human oversight by an authorized Remote Pilot in Command or as soon as practical when a UAS is autonomously launched in response to a call for service. Automated safety features, including obstacle avoidance, return-to-home, autonomous launch, or similar functions, may be used when consistent with FAA regulations, department training, and the authorized mission.~~

~~All UAS equipment will be marked as Law Enforcement equipment in a manner that will not impact flight or safe operation when possible.~~

~~**622.5 Interagency Coordination**~~

~~UAS assistance provided to outside agencies or other City departments shall be for an authorized public safety purpose, approved by the Chief of Police or authorized designee, and documented in accordance with this policy. Data collected during interagency operations shall be handled consistent with this policy, applicable law, and the authorized purpose of the deployment.~~

622.6 PROHIBITED USE

The UAS shall not be used:

To conduct random surveillance activities.

To assist with immigration enforcement.

To target a person based solely on actual or perceived characteristics, such as race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, economic status, age, cultural group, or disability.

To conduct aerial imaging of a person based solely on individual characteristics, such as, but not limited to race, ethnicity, national origin, disability, gender or sexual orientation. This does not apply in situations where these characteristics are specified and paramount to the identification and/or apprehension of a particular person, or group of people, that have committed or are committing a certain felony.

To harass, intimidate, or discriminate against any individual or group.

To conduct personal business of any type.

The UAS shall not be weaponized

The installation, activation, or use of biometric surveillance systems, including facial recognition, in connection with portable recorders is prohibited (Penal Code § 832.19). Reference PPD Policy 447.

Members shall not use facial recognition to actively surveil members of the public through any camera or video device unless the person(s) are under an active criminal investigation or the surveillance is in response to an imminent threat of life. Reference PPD Policy 447.

~~Members shall not use facial recognition on live stream unless there is an imminent threat to life. Reference PPD Policy 447.~~

UAS shall not be used to monitor, track, or document individuals or groups solely because they are engaged in constitutionally protected speech, assembly, or association. ~~This does not prohibit UAS use when necessary for public safety, emergency response, crowd safety, protection of life, or response to an emerging threat.~~

UAS footage shall not be used to identify individuals engaged in lawful expressive activity except when reasonably necessary as part of a specific criminal investigation.

622.7 UAS TRAINING

Personnel assigned to operate or support UAS operations shall complete department approved training and obtain required certifications and/or licenses prior to participating in operations.

~~Remote Pilots in Command (RPIC) shall possess and maintain a valid FAA Remote Pilot Certificate in accordance with 14 C.F.R. Part 107, complete department approved training, and demonstrate proficiency in the safe operation of the assigned UAS.~~

~~RPICs shall maintain compliance with FAA recurrent training requirements and participate in periodic proficiency activities as established by the department.~~

Personnel assigned as Visual Observers (VO) shall complete department approved training appropriate to their assigned role, which shall include the roles and responsibilities of a VO, communication requirements, and basic airspace and safety awareness.

UAS training and proficiency shall be documented in accordance with department procedures.

~~RPICs shall operate UAS in a safe and responsible manner consistent with training, FAA regulations, Department policy, and applicable law. RPICs should evaluate weather, airspace, equipment status, mission needs, and risks to persons or property on the ground, and may modify, delay, terminate, or return the UAS to base when conditions make continued flight unsafe.~~

622.8 UAS MISSION DOCUMENTATION

All UAS deployments will be documented. Documentation should identify the authorization basis for the deployment, including whether the deployment was routine, exigent, interagency, or approved outside the listed uses by the Chief of Police or authorized designee.

Mission documentation should include, when applicable:

- Date and time of deployment
- Location of operation
- Mission purpose or category
- Pilot in command and assisting personnel
- UAS platform used
- Whether images or video were captured
- Associated case number if applicable
- General outcome of the mission

Use of the UAS will be reported annually in the Military Equipment Report pursuant to AB 481.

622.9 RETENTION OF UAS DATA

All recordings of evidentiary value shall be retained for a period consistent with the requirements of the organization's records retention schedule, but no less than 1 year pursuant to Government Code § 34090.6. Reference PPD Policy 450.

The department shall make reasonable efforts to minimize the collection and retention of data that is not relevant to an authorized law enforcement or public safety purpose.

622.10 ACCESS AND SHARING OF UAS DATA

Access to UAS data shall be limited to authorized personnel and legitimate law enforcement, public safety, training, administrative, legal, or evidentiary purposes. UAS data shall not be used for unrelated secondary purposes. Sharing with local, state, federal, or task force partners shall be for a legitimate public safety or law enforcement purpose and consistent with applicable law and department policy.

PROGRAM COORDINATOR

The Chief of Police will appoint a program coordinator who will be responsible for the management of the UAS program. The program coordinator will ensure that policies and procedures conform to current laws, regulations, and best practices and will have the following additional responsibilities:

- Coordinating the FAA Certificate of Waiver or Authorization (COA) application process and ensuring that the COA is current, and/or coordinating compliance with FAA Part 107 Remote Pilot Certificate, as appropriate for department operations.
- Ensuring that all authorized operators and required observers have completed all required FAA and department-approved training in the operation, applicable laws, policies, and procedures regarding use of the UAS.
- Oversight of the Department's UAS training program and ensure that all personnel assigned as operators or observers receive the appropriate training consisted with FAA requirements and Department policy.
- Coordinating the completion of the FAA Emergency Operation Request Form in emergency situations, as applicable (e.g., natural disasters, search and rescue, emergency situations to safeguard human life).
- Maintain UAS inspection, maintenance, and record-keeping to ensure continuing airworthiness of a UAS, up to and including its overhaul or life limits.
- Facilitating law enforcement access to images and data captured by the UAS.
- Recommending program enhancements, practically regarding safety and information security.
- Ensuring that established protocols are followed by monitoring and providing periodic reports on the program to the Chief of Police.
- Maintaining familiarity with the FAA regulatory standards, state laws and regulations, and local ordinances regarding the operations of a UAS.
- Supporting periodic review of the UAS program, including review of deployment data, policy compliance, training compliance, complaints or concerns, and alignment with public safety objectives.
- Coordinating with the Military Equipment Coordinator, when applicable, to ensure UAS reporting is incorporated into AB 481 reporting, public transparency, and governing-body review processes.

- Supporting public-facing transparency efforts regarding the UAS program, including general program information, policy updates, and aggregated deployment data, subject to operational security, officer safety, investigative integrity, and legal restrictions.
- Considering data security, reliability, public safety needs, applicable procurement requirements, and NDAA compliance when recommending UAS equipment or program enhancements.
