SUBJECT: RECOGNIZE REVENUE FROM THE 1999-2000 USED OIL
RECYCLING BLOCK GRANT – FIFTH CYCLE – GRANT NO. UBG5-
96-2092 IN THE AMOUNT OF \$45,728 FROM THE CALIFORNIA
INTEGRATED WASTE MANAGEMENT BOARD.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

1. Authorize the City Manager to enter into an agreement with the California Integrated Waste Management Board to promote enhancement of used motor oil recycling projects in the City of Pasadena.

Approve a journal voucher recognizing and appropriating \$45,728 in revenue from the California Integrated Waste Management Board to the Used Oil Recycling Grant account (budget account 6461-406-764200-93000).

BACKGROUND

On March 3, 1997 the City Council approved submittal of a grant application to the California Integrated Waste Management Board (CIWMB) for the fifth grant cycle (June 30, 1997-June 30, 2000) of the Used Oil Recycling Grant (City of Pasadena Resolution # 7470).

On June 16, 1999 the City of Pasadena was notified that it was awarded \$45,728 for the Fifth Cycle (Year 3) of the Used Oil Recycling Grant to promote used oil recycling. This grant will allow the City to educate the public about proper recycling and disposal of used motor oil. The grant funds will be used to promote used oil recycling during fiscal year 2000; the grant funds expire June 30, 2000.

The CIWMB oversees the State of California's motor oil deposit program. An additional \$0.04 per quart is charged to motor oil consumers, which is then given back to them when they bring their motor oil in to be recycled. Unclaimed redemption monies are


used to provide grant funds to municipalities for promoting used motor oil recycling programs.

According to the grant requirement, "all claimed costs to be funded by grant funds must be clearly related to implementation and operation of a local used oil collection program." The Street Maintenance and Integrated Waste Management Division qualifies in that we offer curbside collection of used motor oil, and we also have ten (10) State-certified oil collection centers within the City of Pasadena. The City will utilize the grant to enhance and expand the existing used motor oil program and continue public education and outreach.

FISCAL IMPACT


The Used Oil Recycling Grant Award is \$45,728 for fiscal year 2000. These funds were anticipated to be received and are included in the Refuse Collection Fund's fiscal year 2000 revenue projections.
